It was lovely to see this ladies face and bring her some unexpected pleasure.



St Mary's Church 900th Anniversary

We have it on the good authority of a previous member of the congregation, the late Dr Charles Coulson (a medieval historian of international stature), that the first stone structure of St Mary's Church in Eastry was started in 1120. Prior to that there was a wooden structure close to Eastry Court which itself was mentioned in the Domesday Book in 1085. In the following 200 years the church



developed its current size and appearance.

Bells were added in the 1600's. Pews were first installed in about 1700 and replaced with the current pews in 1853. In the Victorian era there was much development and enrichment of the internal appearance, most of which is still evident today. Many developments have happened in the last several years and the old lead roof covering over the side aisles will be finally replaced with Zinc this summer.

2020 is therefore the 900th anniversary of this wonderful building which has been the focus for so many important events over so many years.

St Mary's remains an active church community serving the village of Eastry and the surrounding area. The Church itself is freely open each and every day and many people visit it for their own peace and quiet.

We feel that this anniversary is a cause for celebration, not only by the church but by the whole village.

We want this to be a village celebration and to have a legacy. Apart from the church community (who are of course involved in so many other aspects of village life), we want to actively include all the citizens of Eastry. So, the Parish Council, the Twinning Association, the Primary School, the Five Bells, the Theatrical Company, the Horticultural Society, the WI, the Guides, Brownies, Scouts, Cubs etc., local artists and musicians, local sports groups, local businesses, and any other group I may have forgotten will be contacted for their ideas (or should contact me direct!). We have already made a start with an initial steering group and have plans (in their infancy) which may run all year but will have a particular focus in June and July 2020. Rector's Letter

The subject of my letter last month was that of hope – a major, if not defining theme of Easter which celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. There are countless examples of enduring hope and resilience in individual lives, even through the most extraordinary adversity - and we can only marvel at the strength of the human spirit.

But all this has to be placed in the context of recent reports which warn of impending chaos and destruction on an apocalyptic scale. Whilst there are still climate change sceptics, it is undeniable that there is an unprecedented consensus among scientists about the fact of global warming and that this is directly related to human activity. Climate science is inevitably inexact and there are of course statistical quirks which can be cited by those who wish to question the emerging consensus; but these voices are becoming ever more an unconvincing minority. It is now difficult to challenge the conclusion that our planet is warming, that the warming is being driven by the burning of fossil fuels and other human activity and that the consequences are immensely concerning. It seems that whatever we do now, there are going to be serious impacts this century and well beyond, which we shall have to live with.

And alongside the impending crisis that is global warming is the growing concern about diminishing biodiversity. The report, published in May, of the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services, sponsored by the UN, claims that a million species of animals and plants are threatened with extinction; three-quarters of the world's land and two-thirds of its marine environments have been "significantly altered" by human action; urban areas have doubled in size in just the past 30 years; more than 85% of wetlands have been lost; more than 90% of ocean fish stocks are being harvested at or above sustainable levels; and in the last 50 years the number of wild animals have fallen by 85%. We are not merely losing some interesting species, we are endangering the eco-systems necessary for human existence. Sir Robert Watson, who chairs the report writing body writes: 'We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health, and quality of life worldwide.'

But what to do?

From a Christian perspective, there are two principles which may help and inform us.

First, it is a conviction that our planet and all its resources are a gift from God; they are given to us both to enjoy, but also to steward – to look after and nurture. So it is not about being miserable, we are to live life to the full – but in doing so we have a responsibility to use what we have wisely and to care for it and respect it.

Second, in teaching about the Kingdom of God, Jesus (and later St Paul in his letters) speak about a radical inclusivity where everyone, indeed every created thing, is of ultimate worth and value. No one, nothing created, is outside the love of God and all living things deserves our respect. This demands that we drastically reassess the way that our actions impact upon others and upon the whole natural world. It also challenges us to focus on our self-serving interests which so often put our own needs and desires before the well-being of others. The fact that, over the last three or four decades, we have not adequately addressed the major issues facing us is testament to this failing.

So where is the hope?

The hope surely is in us, and we can all make a difference; the hope is in our young people who are demanding change. There are encouraging signs: people are walking and cycling or using public transport instead of their cars; people are eating less meat; people are much more aware of waste and the need to recycle; people are turning their thermostats down and insulating their houses.

As Jesus spoke about God's Kingdom, he also spoke of the empowering Holy Spirit encouraging us to discover a new reality based upon justice and peace. It is this gift which we celebrate on Pentecost Sunday - 9 June this year. Perhaps there is a growing new realisation that rampant consumption is no longer sustainable; perhaps, inspired by the Holy Spirit, we are at the point where there can be a real paradigm shift in our thinking and our behaviour which will put the well-being of all creation before our immediate desires.

There is hope, there is cause for optimism, but we need to act.

In The Garden

It is a shame that for various reasons over the past few years, several flower plants have dropped out of favour, for various reasons.

Dahlias (earwig problems), fuchsias (vine weevils), lily (lily beetle), hosta's (snails & slugs), lily of the valley (growing conditions), delphiniums (snails & slugs), chrysanthemum's (difficult to spell!) and roses (blackspot & aphids).



Well I'm pleased to say that Roses are making a come-back. Lots of new breeds are now disease resistant, and with good garden care, they will give you years of pleasure. There are roses for all conditions and positions in the garden.

There are climbing roses, hybrid tea (bush),floribunda (multi-flowering), patio, ground cover, standard, miniature and roses that will form a hedge. Some roses are grown for their fragrance, such as the "McCartney Rose", "Double Delight", "Gertrude Jekyll", and many more (if you would like a list, just contact me).

There are 'named' roses for everyone and every occasion, 'Adams Rose', 'Charlotte', 'Grace', 'Lovely Lady', 'Mamma Mia', 'Mum in a Million', 'My Lovely Mum', 'Birthday Boy', 'Tom Tom', 'Buxom Beauty', 'Friends Forever', 'Together Forever', and the list goes on and on. There are also child friendly roses which have no thorns.

Roses can be gown under glass, in tubs or containers and of course in the open ground. If grown in containers its nice if you also plant a few spring flowering bulbs and some trailing plants around the edges, also each year remove the top 3-5cm of soil from the top and replace with new fresh compost.

Roses (like me) enjoy being fed, as they make heavy demands on the reserves of plant food in the soil or potting compost. They appreciate their first feed just before the leaves are fully open, and again when the buds are just showing colour, and finally after flowering, but its not advisable to feed after the end of July, otherwise this will encourage soft growth, which could be damaged by an early frost.

It would be nice if all the other flower plants mentioned above, could make a come-back.

Just a Brambling House update. All the containers and pots are now full up with colourful plants and are looking good. The new crown of rhubarb in the new "Vegetable Garden" has taken root and all other vegetables

are coming along nicely. I'm trying a dwarf runner bean this year called "Hestia" which can be grown in pots. I'll let you know in due course how productive it is. The new "Beach Garden" looks lovely with all the grasses and other sea-side plants, in fact, everything is looking lovely.

St Matthew's Fair

In 1447, in the reign of Henry VI, Eastry was granted royal permission to hold an annual fair on 21st September, the feast day of St Matthew the Apostle.

I have long felt that we should revive this ancient custom, but with a modern twist. It was my intention to bring together an informal steering group of like-minded individuals and village organisation to oversee the project and maybe raise some money for local charities. Bird Watching with Big Nick


Many of the resident birds have by now had young and are quite likely to be on a second clutch of eggs. People often ask what to do when they see a young bird on the ground, so here is the advice from the RSPB. "Removal of a fledgling from the wild has to be a very last resort." There are circumstances where it may be appropriate to move a fledgling - but further information can be found on the RSPB website.

Raptors

Many of you may have noticed an increase in the number of buzzards around the village and neighbouring countryside; a couple of birds seem to be resident around Brook Street. Whilst gardening one day I suddenly became aware of a number of herring gulls making a commotion above me and when I looked up two buzzards were drifting overhead, being harassed by the screaming gulls. I now use the noise of the gulls as a prompt to look up, and almost every time it is because of a large raptor passing overhead.

At Easter, four or possibly five red kites floated north overhead; this also got the gulls screaming – taking off from village rooftops to intercept the birds. Many of our birds of prey have made a bit of a recovery in recent years. Red kites have been seen locally on numerous occasions in the last few years – something I couldn't have imagined 10 years ago. And peregrine falcons are again cruising along the cliff tops of Thanet and Dover, as well as on tall buildings like Canterbury Cathedral or the Discovery Park.

This time of year you may be lucky enough to spot a hobby, about kestrel size with long pointed wings, reminiscent of a giant swift, they hunt dragonflies and small birds like swallows and martins. They can arrive in Kent in quite good numbers in early May and then disperse around the country.

Sparrowhawk over our garden

Both the kestrel and sparrowhawk are found locally. The kestrel is a familiar sight as it hovers alongside busy roads, while the sparrowhawk can be harder to see. Unliked by some because it may be found terrorising the garden birds around feeders – the seed attracts the small birds and they in turn attract the sparrowhawk – that's how nature works, and as long as it is in balance, it works well. I have yet to get a really decent picture of a sparrowhawk, but one day I'll get lucky.



Neighbourhood Watch

Eastry residents have been very prompt to report anything suspicious in the village. A cold caller claiming to be an expert in gas and electricity has been door knocking after dark. This is not acceptable, the man was of Asian

appearance wearing a yellow beanie hat. Under no circumstances admit cold callers into the house and also make sure that the back door is locked as it could be a distraction burglary.

The young doorstep sellers are out and about again with the sob story that they have just left the military and need cash to fund further education. The goods on offer are not cheap and can be purchased in our own village shops. Ignore so called identity cards they are meaningless. Don't believe the tale of what your next door neighbour has purchased, they will say anything to make a sale. Another resident has had trouble from doorstep hedge trimmers who tried to tell her that her shrubs were impeding the flow of traffic. These are opportunists and not bona fide council staff. Do not accept quotes on the doorstep, explain that you need three quotes for the work and in any case vegetation should not be pruned while the birds are nesting.

The black and white flat decked lorry is cruising around the streets again looking for metal waste products. Whilst looking for skips the driver and his companion are studying every front garden and driveway so keep all of your belongings under lock and key. Lock and chain garden mechanical tools. Ask Karl our KCC Warden about property marking so that if stolen goods are recovered the police can find the rightful owner.

Thefts from cars are very popular so take everything of any value indoors with you. Even an empty bag could attract the attention of a passing thief, you may know that the bag is empty but the thief does not.

A resident has reported a man in his 40's or 50's taking videos of gardens. This occurred in the area of the footpath from Mill Lane to the Gun Park. Please report any further sightings, the description given was of a man with short dark hair and beard and wearing a dark grey jumper and black coat.

Local Developments



There have been recent announcements that Hadlow College (which owns the Country and Business Parks at Betteshanger) is in financial difficulties. As this issue of the EVN goes to press it, was confirmed that the High Court has declared Hadlow College insolvent because of its inability to repay its debts, which include re-payment of £0.5m which was given towards the proposed Kent Mining Museum at Betteshanger.

The decision has been taken to sell the Betteshanger site in its entirety. The College is currently in discussion with interested parties and the intention is to find a new owner.

A deadline of 31st July has been set. Beyond that date, they are unable to confirm what the future holds but the intention is for the Park to remain open and operations to continue under a new owner.

Proposed location of the "New Town"



It has been in the news that the developer, Quinn Estates, plans to build 3,750 homes on green belt land between Northbourne and Betteshanger. The new town would have an estimated population of 14,000 people compared to that of Eastry which has about 2,500 residents.

In 2017, planning permission was given to build a centre for healthcare businesses at the Business Park which was expected to create 700 jobs by 2020. It must also be in doubt whether this will now go ahead and raises even more concern where people from the new town would be able to find jobs in the locality.

The loss of leisure facilities and jobs close to Eastry coupled with a major increase in housing is worrying for our residents and we will have to watch developments closely.




