STOP Domestic Abuse

Do you change your behaviour because you are frightened of your partner's reaction? Is your partner jealous, possessive or controlling? Do you feel isolated?

Domestic Abuse is any incident or pattern of behaviour of controlling, coercive, threatening behaviour, emotional and psychological abuse, harassment and stalking, financial control, violence or sexual abuse between those aged 16 or over who are or have been intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality. Over 26,000 incidents of domestic abuse were reported across Kent and Medway in 2017.

Richard Samson - 100 years old - 29th November 2020

Richard Samson of Boystown Place, Eastry, joined the Royal Regiment of Artillery at the age of 15 in 1936 as a boy trumpeter and a horseman. In early October, 1939, he sailed for France with and was posted to Rouen where he was in "A" Field Regiment. He saw action in Northern France and was eventually evacuated from Dunkirk. It was while being stationed in Southern England during 1941 that Richard met his future wife, Lilian. However, before too long Richard was posted again - this time to Egypt in May, 1942. He took part in the Western Desert campaigns and fought in the Battles of Halam Halfa and El Alamein.

Following the Allies' victory in North Africa, Richard was posted to Sicily in 1943 and then to Italy in 1944, before returning to 'Blighty' where he was seconded to the Royal Engineers. Foregoing officer training, Richard took part in the Battle of Normandy and remained in the European Theatre until the end of the war. Richard's WWII medals are numerous. His admirable service record is perhaps best summarised by the awarding of the Dunkirk Medal (British and French) and the Normandy Medal. In 2017, he was awarded the prestigious Legion d'honneur.

To mark the occasion of Richard's 100th birthday, Eastry and Deal Branches of the Royal British Legion were privileged to parade in his honour in front of his house. Richard Cast, RBL Kent Chairman, addressed the assembled well-wishers and paid tribute to Richard's distinguished service.


Eastry kids say please **SLOW DOWN!**

Rectors Letter - Will Christmas be cancelled in 2020?

The big caveat, as I write this letter in mid-November, is that I have no idea how things may turn out over the next fortnight – let alone into December! Will lockdown end at the beginning of December? Will it be extended? Will new restrictions be in place? By the time anyone is reading this, the answers will be known, or be much clearer, but for now a little speculation will do no harm. It is no surprise that the pagan festivals, which were adopted by the Christian faith in Europe, occurred around the winter solstice when the weather was at its bleakest. It was (and is) a time when folk needed a bit of a celebration to raise spirits and look forward to brighter times to come. Certainly no exception this year. So, today, the celebration of Christmas is an important time for us all. We delight in Christmas because it is an opportunity to get together as family and friends, to express our value of each, to forget our troubles and to look forward - at least that is how it should be.

The emergence of the virus, and the threat that our usual celebrations may not be possible - at least in the way we have come to expect - gives rise to a genuine sense of unease for us. It is not just the potential loss of an important time of gathering, but also the real uncertainty that we currently face and the difficulty in planning anything. Coronavirus has also taught us that we can look at things differently and that there can be unexpected benefits. We have found that, in our local communities, we can look out more for the lonely and vulnerable and respond to their needs; we have discovered that we can use empty rooms to house the homeless; we have ensured that our foodbanks are well resourced; we have learned that we can pollute less and breathe cleaner air.

COVID-19 has reminded us that wealth does not assure us of security, or that great power can fend off every threat. It has also shown us that we may dare to hold a vision for the future which is different. Once the real threat has passed, it will be tempting to return to our old securities and try to hold on to what was once safe. But our eyes have now been opened to different possibilities, which require courageous faithful thought and bold faithful action. We have been offered the vision of a world of generous, neighbourly compassion - and we need to grasp it. This coronavirus, for all its unwelcome and damaging consequences, has also necessitated us to examine again old certainties which in turn has the potential to open new and hopeful futures.

So as we look forward to our Christmas celebrations, they may well not turn out as we would have anticipated them to be. It does not mean that Christmas is cancelled; it does allow us to think carefully about why the celebration of Christmas is special. If it transpires to be a little less of a consumerist frenzy, and a little more of an open awareness of neighbours and friends, then the changes necessitated by this dreadful virus might just prove to have had a beneficial and perhaps lasting impact on us for the good. In the meantime, may this Christmastide for you be a time of joy, peace and hope.

Betteshanger Woods orchids



White Hellborine

Simon Dundas' recent and very enjoyable contribution about a walk from Eastry to Tilmanstone and Betteshanger woods (Betteshanger is Saxon for a settlement in the woods) set me thinking. He found wild orchids (White Hellborine and Green Twayblade) at the Tilmanstone end of the woods while I remember finding the Helleborines many years ago in Sangrado's Wood, at the Betteshanger end at a piece of

woodland just inside the Eastry boundary. It was very dark under the trees and I was surprised to find orchids growing in such conditions. The Twayblade were about ½ mile away under a larch plantation, such elegant and dainty green flowers!

He had wondered why there was a cottage in the middle of the woods. This was the gamekeepers cottage as, until recently, there has always been a shoot

on the estate - originally pheasants but latterly partridges. Mention was made of the track leading towards Betteshanger Church, shown as a Roman road on the map, and it is in fact Watling Street and leads to Dover. A favourite hike of groups of Green Twayblade young people over the years. Sheila Smith

Eastry has a very special place in the heart of author Stephanie Upton. Along with Deal, Sandwich and Dover these are the places she used to go to visit family for many years. Originally from Thanet she now lives in Staffordshire but in early 2020 bought Gore Cottage in Gore Lane, one of our older properties. This was the home of her late uncle, Mervyn 'the Mole Man' (a familiar figure in Eastry with his many and varied dogs) and aunt Jan Bryant. In recent years it had fallen into a state of disrepair but Stephanie and her husband Jamie have now restored it to its former glory and will use at as their base in Kent as well as offering it as a holiday rental. They have come to feel very much part of the village and often received kind and encouraging words of support from passers-by during this project.

Stephanie has previously written some short stories but her ambition has always been to write a book that features the areas in East Kent that she loves and includes some of the ideas she has formulated over her career and her life experiences. She has a degree in psychology, has worked for Social Services and has a biological child and an adopted child. She is fascinated by the debate about nature versus nurture and which of these forms us into who we are. Is it nature (it's in your genes) or nuture (you are who you are because of your experiences) and whether we are generally biased towards nature. Her debut novel explores both and addresses their consequences through the lives of two women.



MotheRing...a local story

This story starts just after World War Two and finishes twenty years later. Set mainly in Dover and Gravesend (Eastry, Deal, and Broadstairs do get a mention!) it is full of the sites of Dover and the surrounding area. The protagonists are an adoptive mother and a stepmother (both usually portrayed as 'evil' or wicked in many stories and films) whose life stories are interwoven. Sadly, very rarely does anyone believe and acknowledge the love and strong bond that non-birth mothers can have with their children - until now!

An emotive story showing that positive nurturing has a hugely beneficial effect on child development and contains many thought provoking issues for the reader to consider. So if you are a birth mother, step mother, grandmother, foster or adoptive mother Stephanie hopes you will enjoy this "feel-good" novel.

'MotheRing' is now available at Amazon for £7.99, the Kindle version is £1.99 and it is in Sandwich, Broadstairs and Deal libraries.



Beacon View Vets Update

First of all, we would like to **thank everyone** for their kind support during this slightly bizarre year! We have been very busy recently and it has been a pleasure to meet you and your pets. Due to your support support we have two new additions here. Our new vet Cate has a vast array of talents from chronic pain management and acupuncture to soft tissue surgery and feline medicine. Kat, our third registered veterinary nurse, has fitted right in to our friendly and compassionate team.

With Christmas just around the corner we wanted to highlight a few hazards to watch out for to make your pet's Christmas as smooth as possible. Let's face it, with covid still here, Christmas 2020 is going to be more pet focused than ever!

- 1) Stress doesn't help with anything and stressed dogs can be more prone to illness, and possibly even injury. The sudden appearance of flashing lights, singing snowmen and a giant reindeer may be enough to make anyone jump; so, let your dog acclimatise to the new decor, especially if it's their first Christmas. If your pet doesn't like loud noises then it is important to ensure they have a snug area they can retreat to for some down time. Party poppers and crackers may also be best avoided if your pet becomes anxious about fireworks.
- 2) Christmas decorations can pose a hazard in many ways. Firstly, some dogs do love to explore with their mouths and I have seen multiple cases where dogs have accidentally swallowed indigestible items which have then caused an obstruction in the bowel and required surgery. It's also worth keeping your bin well secured as it's not uncommon for dogs to steal carcasses and cooked bones which can be very hazardous due to their sharp edges.
- 3) Chocolate appears everywhere at Christmas; on the tree and bursting out of presents! Dogs with an appetite for drama may strike at an opportune moment (maybe as Dad falls asleep after Christmas lunch!) to grab some treats. Chocolate by itself can be lethal and at Christmas the risks are even higher with liqueur chocolates on the horizon. Any chocolate ingestion is worth querying with a vet so I'd recommend calling us if you think your dog has managed to gobble some.
- 4) Unfortunately, another toxin we see frequently in the holidays are raisins; lurking everywhere from mince pies and stollen to braised red cabbage and Christmas pudding. The mechanism that underlies raisin toxicity is not fully understood but can be fatal to both dogs and cats. Not all pets will show signs of toxicity, whereas others can eat a tiny amount and experience serious consequences. The toxin can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and lethargy but some dogs will develop kidney and liver failure. There is no way of telling which dogs will be affected so we recommend precautionary treatment for any dog known to have eaten grapes, raisins, currants or sultanas. If you're thinking of leaving a mince pie out for Santa, make sure it is well out of the snout zone!

Memories of Betteshanger & Northbourne Park

I and my brothers and sisters were brought up in Betteshanger and spent many



hours exploring our surroundings. Recently I popped back to the Church expecting to see it and its grounds as they were when we had our family weddings and christenings and Sunday School there. Covid 19 appears to have taken its toll. Northbourne Park School now administer the Church and I assume that with furlough and the school unoccupied it has become a wonderful haven for wild life but sadly looks a bit bedraggled. Within that graveyard is a tribute to Gladstone who enjoyed visiting and loved the trees within the

estate. Fortunately the Gingko Biloba (*Japanese fossil tree*) opposite the main door is now a beautiful mature specimen whereas the pond, where we spent hours studying the tadpoles, looks very sorry for itself behind a fence with a 'Deep Water' warning sign. Back then there was no Health and Safety, we didn't have a watch (or a mobile!) and we were left to our own devices.

Within the estate are the Dutch Gardens, often used for Shakespearean productions by the boarders at the school. Local children were always invited to attend and although we didn't understand much it kept us entertained. The local children were also invited to Guy Fawkes celebrations and Matron would serve trays of Parkin - everyone wearing wellies while some of the schollboys delighted in scaring us with jumping jacks. An Austrian teacher, Miss Leuven, would run our Sunday School and our sheepdog would always come with us, laying in the aisle with the school choirboys stepping over her.

Much has changed around Betteshanger, the cottage behid the Church was the coachman's residence with tumble-down stables around the yard. Next door was the dairy with its herd of Jersey cows who got infected when Johns Disease got into the pasture. Round the corner was the blacksmith's forge but as tractors became more prominent the blacksmith set up a travelling forge and went to race meetings and other horse events. The carpenter's yard had already closed yet I can almost hear the sound of the saw mills now as it catered for estate repairs. The kitchen gardens are now derelict as are all the Victorian greenhouses and six bothies that housed the under-gardeners but the head gardener's cottage is still used for accomodation for school staff.

In the Garden

What a year this has been - certainly one that the younger generation will remember for a long time. Through the gloom and doom there has been sunshine, as lots of us ventured into our gardens to get away from the everyday depressing news. I surely did and my garden has had a total revamp. With help from my family we have converted what was becoming an unmanageable wilderness into a garden with a purpose (eat your heart out the Garden Rescue Team). Overgrown shrubs removed, two out of my three greenhouses gone and replaced with 42m2 of turf, 25 square meters of decking, raised beds, new fencing and a shingle area for my cactus in the summer. I did however keep my roses and fuchsias.

I hope you have all been enjoying your garden as much as I have, and to help you in planning your garden for next year, I have listed 10 of my favourite garden plants.

1. Roses - There are variety of roses available for every one's taste, one of my favourites is "Tequila Sunrise" when it catches the sun it will brighten up any garden. For wonderful fragrance you will not beat "The McCartney Rose" and for the back of the border "Lucky".

2. Daffodils - They welcome you into the Spring, again so many varieties to choose from, but I'm sure our Eastry grower, Ray Sedgwick (National Exhibitor & Trophy Winner) would be pleased to advise you of the best garden varieties.

dinner plate size blooms, two top growers in Eastry are Trevor Burton and Sheila Broster, and again I'm sure they would be pleased to guide you in the right direction as regards to garden varieties.



4. Carnations/Pinks - If it's fragrance you are after, these are the flowers for you. A beautiful carnation named "Candy Cane" is really stunning.



- **5. Sunflowers -** a must for any family garden. Children just love to see them grow, especially the tall varieties, but for a sunflower with a difference try growing the "*Teddy Bear Varieties*".
- **6. Fuchsias** fuchsias have gone through phases of being popular then un-popular garden plants. I have stood by them and would recommend a variety named "genii". This plant will



not only give you an abundance of flowers but also golden green foliage. It is hardy, but I recommend you prune it back by two-thirds in the spring to give nice new shoots.

7. Sweet Peas - I've always said "A flower garden is not a flower garden, unless it has Sweet Peas" no other flower can produce a fragrance like Sweet Peas and my favourite, also the late Earl of Guilford's, (who I used to work for) is "Painted Lady". To keep the fragrance, buy new seed each year, do not save seed as they could have been cross-pollinated with other Sweet Pea varieties.



- **8. Hydrangea -** You can grow Hydrangea's in the garden or containers, there are various shades of pink and blue varieties, but my favourite is the white one named *"Annabelle"*. It will lighten up any dark spot in your garden.
- **9.** London Pride A real old-fashioned garden plant, one of my Grans favourite along with "Lily of the Valley". It is low growing with a steady spread. A close-up of the flower is gorgeous. Variegated leaf varieties are now available.
- **10. Snowdrops** As we enter a new year what better flower to greet us than the Snowdrop. They will multiply each year, and when the clump gets too big, split them up soon after the flowers have faded away (called "in the green") and replant.







I hope you have enjoyed my slightly different article, and I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Christmas, and whatever next year brings you, stay safe, and may God Bless You and Protect You.

Managing Nature



Working as a conservation volunteer I spend much of my time with a brush cutter cutting down brambles, buckthorn, young willow, reeds, thistles and rank grasses at the end of the summer..... destroying bits of nature, why? Left alone most areas of Britain not built on would eventually become covered in woodland.... the result of succession. Farmers prevent this by planting crops, harvesting them then, usually, ploughing before starting all over again. If they keep sheep,

cattle, deer etc. these graze down the grassland or this is cut for hay or silage. All these activities prevent succession, keeping the land open as arable or grassland.

Sadly economic pressures mean that most farmland supports relatively little wildlife, through the use of fertilisers and pesticides and the pressure to maximise the area of land cultivated, removing copses, ponds, hedges, verges etc. Hence the need for areas left for nature to flourish; nature reserves, small and large.





Succession applies to these too; if 'left to let nature take its course' all would end up covered in scrub or woodland. Whilst these are valuable habitats supporting much wildlife

if we are to maximise biodiversity we need to **manage** the habitat. Every element in the "scenery' we love to enjoy is the result of human management, either for agriculture or **conservation**. There are virtually no true **wilderness areas**, areas which are **entirely** the result of natural succession, in Britain. Even our woodlands are **secondary**. They have been planted by human hands at some point in their history and

are managed, increasingly planting a variety of native British trees and creating clearings, rides, areas of mature and areas of younger, growing trees. All this maximises the variety of wildlife they support.

So, why am I brush cutting? To maintain natural meadow conditions, full of wild flowers and insects. These are different from farm pastures as the soil is not fertilised artificially to make the grass grow more, at the expense of the wild flowers. Reeds are cut to prevent them spreading out and colonising more and more of shallow waters; to keep open water for fish, lilies, ducks...... all the things we hope to see at a pond or lake.

Preparing for over wintering is the easy time for a beekeeper but not the bees. As I write this, mid October, they are very busy collecting pollen and nectar from ivy. What a crop this year as you may have noticed on passing the school play area in the gun park. All of this goes into their stores which has to last them four to five months until the Spring flowers, about 20 kilo's needed.

My job is to keep the predators away. The wasp problem is virtually over. Mice love to get in for the winter so we fit 'mouse guards'. The mice will build a nest inside, lovely and warm and loads of food on tap. Woodpeckers can be a problem. They drill a hole into the side of the hive, the bees poke their head out and 'bingo', a free morsel for the bird. Beekeepers sometimes use net/wire netting, to wrap the hives in but I have found the good ole garden remedy, hanging up old Cd's works as well. All of my hives are wrapped in 50mm insulation.

The little crab like Varoa mite which invades our hives all year round, has to be controlled since its arrival in the UK from the far east, (there's a surprise!), as they will destroy a colony. The Asian hornet is on its way to us from Asia - surprised? I think only one nest has been found this year against six or seven last year in the UK. I was fortunate enough to see a queen hornet operating outside a hive in France two years ago - they hover, grab an incoming bee and fly off with it back to their nest. They will destroy a hive of bees and their nest is as big as a football.

Humans - I have had hives vandalized and destroyed on four occasions - this 1981 photo by Basil Kidd was taken for the East Kent Mercury - and people often steal hives as well. After all that I have written about over the last months you must surely be thinking - well, a pot of honey should be worth at least £20. Hmm hmm. Nevertheless I hope you have enjoyed my ramblings on the art of keeping bees. Next time - Adulteration of honey and fake honey - this has become a huge problem!

Bird Watching with Big Nick

I ended my last article by saying that I'd missed the Red-backed Shrike seen on Worth Marshes but I hoped one day I would see one in the UK. Well, I got my chance in October when a juvenile turned up at St Mary's Bay. It was very confiding, and so I was able to get some good photos. They perch on a wire or branch and watch for their prey, flying down to grab a beetle, grasshopper or even small lizard; this one caught a wasp while I was watching. It was an interesting autumn for me with some scarce visitors to the area, but more on this later.



It will be winter by the time you are reading this and the garden birds will be spending most of their daylight hours finding food to fuel them through the long, cold nights. Bird feeders are an important source of food for many of our regular garden visitors. I listened to someone on the radio a while ago; he said that feeding the birds was ridiculous, that they had managed perfectly well for thousands of years without help from us. Possibly a valid point but in reality he didn't mention that the world the birds live in now is a much different place to even 100 years ago.

Changes to agricultural practices, the necessity for new homes and more roads have all reduced the availability of habitat and food sources for many of our native species. So I don't think supplementing their food supply is at all ridiculous and it should be encouraged. In return many of us will get pleasure in seeing and hearing the birds that take advantage of it.

I mentioned earlier that it had been a good autumn for me as a birder; one species I've wanted to see but have never had the opportunity to, is the Wryneck, a bird of the woodpecker family, slightly smaller than a Starling. It no longer breeds in the UK and is now only a passage migrant with fewer than 300 recorded each year. Sightings of one at Swalecliffe were all I needed; I drove there and was lucky enough to locate and photograph it - I returned a happy man!


