#### **Dick Laslett MBE (1940-2021)**

The passing of Dick Laslett will leave a huge hole in the life of our village. That familiar, cheerful figure, often seen in his large white van on his way to Bickers or to the Young Peoples Club, finally lost his courageous fight against cancer on 29th June.

Dick was born into a farming family and grew up, with his younger brother Bill and elder sister Elizabeth, on his parents farm at Great Selson. He was in his mid teens and studying at Kent College when

both his parents died after an horrific car accident on the outskirts of Canterbury. Sadly the loss of their parents also meant the loss of the tenancy on their farm at Selson but Bill and Dick managed to buy Weddington Farm in Ash to continue their farming lives and later Dick lived and worked at Eastry Court Farm for many years where part time work was always available for youngsters. Ironically the crash happened only a spit away from what is now the fantastic Polo Farm Sports Club that Dick co-founded in the 1970's. He led the development at Polo Farm, "a man of vision, who was instrumental in setting up one of the finest centres of hockey in the country." (Richard Goodenough)

Dick was a talented sportsman especially as a hockey player for Canterbury Hockey Club and was 1st XI captain from 1962 until 1969, progressing rapidly through the club administration and was made a life member in 1988. He served on the Kent Committee for over 20 years and was elected President of Kent County Hockey Club. He was instrumental in getting up a side of "Laslett's", from within the larger family, to play against a club side on Boxing Day. This even attracted a mention in the Daily Telegraph and is a tradition that continues to this day (Covid permitting!). A good cricketer, he was captain of Ash Cricket Club for several years with at least a handful of good cricketer "Laslett's" in every team and would often be found running the bar, once his playing days were over, with his usual bonhomie and willingness for a chat - a position he would often assume at Polo Ground as well.



Eastry village too has benefitted from Dick's drive, energy and enthusiasm. He, through the various committees on which he served, established the Eastry Young Peoples Club for the growing number of young people in the village, helping to secure some of the funding for our splendid club house from the Coalfields Regeneration Trust. Eastry Parish Council helped the fund raising by agreeing to sell some land to build an extension to Swaynes Way. Dick was very much hands on throughout the building stage and, after completion, he continued as Chairman and Youth Club Leader. He showed amazing leadership of this Club yet was always very modest in his work for the club. He also secured the funding to establish Bubbles, a much needed private nursery in our growing village.

The fact that both of these facilities are thriving today is a tremendous legacy to his many years of hard work and often single-minded determination. "He dedicated his time to ensure young people had a place to call their own, to meet and socialise in our community. Dick has played a huge part in many generations of young peoples lives, always giving them time, attention, advice and never excluding any young person. The doors of the club have always been open to them all. He is a true legend who will be greatly missed by so many." (Joanne Barham -EVF))



The culmination of Dick's contribution to so many of our lives was the well deserved award of MBE in November 2009 - for outstanding achievement to the community. It is an award which sums up Dick's lifetime contribution perfectly." (Richard Goodenough)

#### Don't get the HUMP!

Many of you will have seen our Community Speedwatch volunteers monitoring traffic and speeds at different locations and times throughout Eastry. And whilst we've mostly received support, we've also had our critics. Fair enough, for there is nothing more irritating than having a speed gun pointed at you as you're rushing home, or stressing about where you're supposed to be when you're not going to make it on time. We've all been there. But let's rewind to remind you of **why** we're doing this.

Back in the thick of winter lockdown, a car came hurtling down Lower Street and had to brake hard to miss something crossing the road. It skidded, did a 360-degree turn, ploughing into two parked cars in the process, and came to a halt literally inches from the windows of someone's living room where they were peacefully watching evening TV. The dazed young bloke driving was shocked to the core, not to mention the owners of the wrecked cars. Enough was enough, said the house owners surveying the accident two feet away from their armchairs. It was one too many near misses caused by speeding motorists and an accident waiting to happen. So the Lower Speed Street (LSS) campaign began, first with artwork designed by concerned pupils of Eastry Primary School to plead with people to SLOW DOWN and latterly with Community Speedwatch. It's not that we love being out there. Yes we have better things to do, but let's face it: it's no good saying what are "they" going to do about it. Who are "they"? The Parish Council? Kent Country Council? The Police? WE, all of us who live in this village, are "they." Public organisations are underfunded and under-resourced and anyway, they can't make any changes to our road traffic systems or anything else until they have proof that changes are needed.

Anecdotes aren't enough. They need data - the number of vehicles passing through the village, the speed of those vehicles and who are persistent speedsters. Data has to be collected over many months, then it is analysed. And if it proves we need traffic calming measures, or new roads, or improvements to signage, or lower speed limits, only then will the funding and workforce be made available by local government to undertake the work. Remember too that Eastry is in for a LOT of housing development under the new Dover District Plan. So far, Eastry has *no* planned public funding for any extra infrastructure – roads for example – to take all the traffic this new housing will generate. But if we have the traffic data to support our case, we have a fighting chance of getting the extra dosh to right that wrong. So thanks to those who support The Community Speedwatch group – we'll keep you all updated.

And please, we're supported by the Parish Council, but we need more volunteers.

**Eastry Caves** 

There is much speculation as to the origin of the labyrinth of caves, which are beautifully carved and extend in galleries to nearly 700ft. It is possible that they may have been used for secret worship in times of religious persecution or were possibly used as grain storage chambers. It is said that Thomas Becket hid in the caves before making his escape to France in 1164.

Eastry Caves lie under "Beckets" in Gore Road, were probably started around 1811 when Abraham Foord, a bricklayer, started to extract chalk to burn into lime. The Foord family continued to mine chalk until 1907 when there was concern from local villagers that the tunnels were undermining their houses and property although this was not the case at all. The passages were cut with a small



tool, maybe a small pickaxe, and are narrow with arched roofs and are often only 5ft in height. They lead round in elongated quadrant shapes to a deep well just behind the cottage. Each quadrant gets smaller and closer to the well and each has an opening into the well. In later years these passages were used for festivities on Eastry Fair days, fortune tellers and the like and the well was used as a wishing well. They began to make a folly of the passages - rooms appeared - one is known




as the Chapel and another is the Picture Gallery. Coffin boards were nailed to the walls but only the rusting iron nails now remain. In World War II the caves were used by the local Home Guard and the long gallery was used for target practice with .22 rifles.

The caves were opened to the general public in the 1960's and two huge stained glass windows were painted (the imposing warrior on the front cover and the "murder window" on the left). It cost 1/6 for adults and 6d for children but it was not a successful business venture and the caves reverted back to private ownership.

#### Gardening on the other side of the fence (2)

The weather has continued to dominate the news since my last article with a record-setting wet May and then an extremely dry June and then gales on the 6<sup>th</sup> July following on from the late,cold spring. Nationwide reports of 50-60% of blue and great tit nests failing this year due to the chicks hatching before the caterpillars had appeared due to their trees being late coming into leaf. Our climate continues to change and nature can't always adapt. Now many gardeners are concerned about insects spoiling the appearance of various plants and shrubs but with a different approach to the way you view your gardening, you can double your enjoyment of your space by realising that you are contributing to your local biodiversity by not reaching for the bug spray at the first sign of aphids. Most pesticides are indiscriminate and will kill beneficial predators as well as the intended 'pests' but it takes longer for the predators to recover and you will then have increased numbers of pests in subsequent months or years.

This spring I have seen black aphids in large numbers on newly planted spindle, elder and some thistles I have allowed to grow. All three have been completely cleared by ladybird larvae in the space of 10 days. However a very bold Wood Pigeon ate all my peas which are only about 8 feet from our back door and two varieties of kale are requiring night-time slug patrols. Otherwise the local hedgehogs appear to be doing a good job

In green gardening news two recent announcements will affect home gardeners: Slug pellets containing metaldehyde will be banned from Spring 2022. This is a second ban after a previous one was overturned. And also peat will be banned for home use from 2024. This was also previously announced in 2011 with a voluntary phase out to be completed by 2020. This has been a complete failure and there is a lot of work to be done to achieve this new target. It isn't that there aren't viable alternatives but there are concerns that the industry can't produce enough of the new product. Some large stores have already said they will bring in bans sooner. It will be these big players that will will drive the change but you can contribute by continuing to ask for peat-free composts. The local garden centres and nurseries do stock them. And from next year, Which Gardening magazine will only be testing peat-free for their Best Buys.

This year the Wildlife Trusts have been promoting projects to help beetles. I have installed a beetle bucket (a hole in the ground filled with woodchips or old timber debris!) with the intention of providing egg-laying habitat for Stag Beetles and I have just commenced digging a pond and the spoil will be heaped to create a beetle-bank. These raised grassy areas are used in farming to give these predators refuge and provide a variance of habitat in a wildlife-friendly garden.





Although we have yet to know the voting result of the latest resolution, it seems likely that it will be carried with a large majority, so I'm going to take the chance of writing about it here. I feel it is an important issue for all women and husbands or partners should also be aware that sometimes niggling symptoms their wives or partners complain of can be sometimes be indicative of a more serious problem.

Our resolution is **A call to increase awareness of the subtle signs of ovarian cancer**. The symptoms of ovarian cancer include: feeling constantly bloated; a swollen tummy; discomfort in your tummy or pelvic area; feeling full quickly when eating; and/or loss of appetite; and needing to pee more often than normal.

However, because the early signs of ovarian cancer are similar to conditions such as irritable bowel syndrome (IBS), and pre-menstrual syndrome (PMS), it is often not diagnosed immediately. Sometime women are embarrassed to revisit a GP with seemingly vague symptoms and doctors are now becoming more aware of the need for early diagnosis.

The earlier ovarian cancer is diagnosed the easier it is to treat and so public awareness and understanding of the symptoms is really important.

# A letter from Bishop Rose, Bishop of Dover, about the recent changes within our Benefice.

During the last 18 months, we have experienced so many changes not only nationally in our country, but also in the life of our Church and in our communities. Here in Canterbury Diocese, we too have been exploring how best to serve our communities in a changing world. A particular area that we continue to address is how best to serve all our communities with fewer and fewer resources. Going forward however, we do have a vision for a church that is flourishing and sustainable. This vision will only become a reality if all God's people begin to work together to build up the body of Christ in the places where we live and worship. This vision will become a reality when we pray for God to raise up local leaders lay and ordained to serve amongst us. Here in the benefice of Eastry and Woodnesborough, we too are experiencing this change first-hand. There has been change with more people working alongside David and Sandra to serve the people of these communities.

Over the next few weeks and months, we will be going up a gear with Sandra moving to her first incumbency, and David moving to a fresh challenge. Their leaving will lead to us beginning an interregnum and during this vacancy we will have to look at different ways of doing services at least for a time. Losing our full-time clergy within the same time frame is not ideal. However, we face this change with God's grace and the hope that we will be guided by the Spirit as we discern together what God has in store for us. I am thankful that here in Eastry and Woodnesborough, we have an able group of churchwardens and other ministers. Having met you, I am impressed by your vision and confidence in serving the benefice. The Churchwardens now have the task of working with me and the Archdeacon to recruit a new parish priest to lead in ministry going forward. That new priest will be someone who can work collegially, enabling the gifts of everyone to be used in ministry and making the benefice vision a reality.

Over the next few weeks, the churchwardens and others will be putting together a benefice profile which will put that vision into words, explore what the deanery plan means for the benefice, and describe what these communities need from a new parish priest, not only for each of our churches but for the wider community as well. There will be a special joint meeting of the church councils to adopt the profile and to elect representatives to the recruitment process. All of this will happen in time for the post to be advertised over the summer and interviews to take place in the early autumn. If all goes to plan, a new parish priest could be in place early in 2022.

I know that the process of clergy moving amidst so much change is difficult-but I also know that God is with us. God is a God of change, able to support us, work with us, and help us be his people. I believe that God will work through this time of change to refresh and renew us and our service that our Church may flourish and make a difference to all of those around us.

I am deeply thankful for the many ways in which I have been enriched during my time here, and for all that so many have given, and I trust I have not taken too much for granted. May God bless you in all that you do



#### **Beacon View Vets Update**

Hi everyone! We hope you are all well and enjoying life returning to some sense of normality. We have been able to welcome you back inside the practice with your pets for several weeks now and it's been wonderful to see you all.

We have recently been made aware by the British Veterinary Association that they have seen an increase in cases of blue-green algae. This is something that all dog parents should beaware of – especially those with dogs who enjoy a good swim! Blue green algae, or cyanobacteria, are a group of bacteria that can contain dangerous toxins which can be harmful and potentially fatal to pets, livestock and birds if ingested even in small quantities.

Blue green algae is often present in still bodies of water such as ponds and lakes which we have quite a few of around Sandwich and Deal. During spells of hot dry weather, the algae rapidly multiplies and blooms appear. These blooms can cause the water to become cloudy, blocking sunlight to plants and organisms below and the water may also take on a blue or green tinge. You may also spot a scum around the edges of infected water. Dogs can swallow it by drinking water from an affected lake, river or pond or while licking their fur after going for a swim.

Symptoms of exposure can appear within a few minutes or hours and can include vomiting, diarrhoea, drooling, disorientation, breathing issues and even seizures. If left untreated, it can cause liver damage and ultimately be rapidly fatal. Please contact your vet if you are concerned that your dog may have been exposed.

We have also seen a huge surge in the number of dogs getting grass seeds stuck in their eyes, ears and feet. Grass seeds can cause a lot of irritation and are problematic if they manage to pierce the skin as their barbed prongs mean that they can only travel in one direction and drive themselves deeper into the skin and underlying tissues. We advise checking for any plant matter between your dogs toes, in their ears and around their eyes after each walk to help avoid problems.

Thank you for all your support so far in 2021, we have two new team members joining us in August and we look forward to introducing you to them in the next newsletter.

#### **Our Honey Bees - Ray Checksfield**

Amazing. In the last EVN I posted a few of our bees that we see mostly around Eastry but I did forget one that seems to be very prominent in our village most years. That is the Red Minor bee, also called a Mining bee and Mortar bee. I had a visit from a local lady. She had bees entering under cladding on the house and would I have a look as she had called in the vermin people and he said they were honey bees and he could not destroy them. I did visit, definitely not honey bees and these were this mortar bee and were obviously tunneling into the insulation.

This queen is a solitary bee, no nest as such, and she will excavate a tunnel some 6 to 10 inches long, in a sandy bank or in walls with soft mortar, lay an egg along with nectar and pollen, seal it and then lay another egg, pollen etc until the tube is full. Move on to the the next place and so on. Amazingly the young all hatch and fly out at the same time. They love old houses with just sand and lime between the bricks and years ago they reckon that these mortar bees were responsible for demolishing walls? Even houses?



May was a dreadful month weather wise for the bees. June came good. The bees flying in between the rain and cold, building up the colony and managed to bring me home a few jars of honey. Did you notice along the Sandwich bypass where the two tea vans park. The white blossom on those cherry plum trees and blackthorn was amazing but the bees stayed in and these flowers never got pollinated due to the adverse cold weather and now, no fruit at all along there. We need our pollinators for sure.

#### The significance of biodiversity loss

**Does it matter?** Yes, a lot. For a start it is unethical of humans to bring about the, often needless, destruction of plants and animals, unfair to the species made extinct and to our children who will be unable to enjoy them. It is also very damaging to our interests now: The widespread use of insecticides to protect our crops has resulted in loss of insect life of all types. These chemicals are often non selective, killing the insect predators of pest insects. This, and the growing of **monocultures**, huge fields growing just one sort of crop, means pest numbers actually increase, causing more pesticide use. Many of the insects killed are valuable **pollinators** needed for many crops to mature. Without pollinators a large proportion of our food would be lost.

If the biodiversity in a habitat is high each species has a range of food species, so if one becomes scarce others are available. Similarly each species has a range of predators, so if one declines others will take more of the prey species so the size of each species population remains stable. Where biodiversity is low food shortages cause predator population declines causing the prey population to increase enormously, eat all the food available and starve. The whole system is unstable Sometimes this has a negative effect upon mankind, for instance when vast swarms of locusts or weaver birds devastate all the crops over a wide area, causing starvation.

Many new medicines are first discovered in plants or animals. The fewer species around the less chance of finding a medicine. Increasingly, crop plants or animals are improved by introducing genes from other, wild, species, either by selective breeding or gene therapy. The fewer species around the less scope for this.

All species have pathogenic bacteria and viruses which are well adapted to life in that species so do limited harm to their hosts, which continue to survive and provide them with food and shelter. If a species declines its pathogens, with fewer suitable hosts, will increasingly occur in other species, having more serious effects upon their new hosts. Increasingly, as wild mammal populations decline and human activity penetrates even remote areas some of these pathogens enter humans and may cause serious epidemics.

Arguably, Covid 19 is one such, probably infecting humans either directly from bats or indirectly via, possibly, pangolins sold for human consumption.

How do human activities cause so much extinction? In the natural world death of individuals is due to *starvation*, *disease* or *predation*. If predation increases competition for food decreases and, with smaller numbers present, spread of disease is reduced, so the population recovers. For this reason primitive tribes have survived for generations, living as hunters. Only with the invention of guns and transport to rapidly seek out prey have human hunters managed to kill so many of a species as to upset the natural recovery mechanism. Extinction of the Dodo and the almost extinction of the North American Bison are well known examples.

Far more significant is **habitat destruction**. We build on natural habitats, cut down forests to create grazing land or for growing arable crops, drain marshes for the same uses etc. This is what drives most extinction. **Climate change** causes habitats to become unsuited to some species, which either move or become extinct. It may allow others to increase their range; many species from southern Europe are spreading into the UK, but overall the effect of climate change is to further increase extinction rates.

#### **Bird Watching with Big Nick**

My inspiration this month came when I was stopped in the High Street by a Tilmanstone man who asked if I were the "Nick Smith who wrote the bird column", I had to admit I was! I had previously commented, either in this column or elsewhere, that although the Nuthatch is relatively common and widespread bird in the UK, I'd never seen one locally – the nearest being in Blean Woods near Canterbury. That was until last summer when I saw a pair in woods near Adisham - they're getting closer to Eastry!

The Tilmanstone man, referring to my comments regarding the lack of Nuthatches, said that a pair had been seen in woods near him, by a reliable birdwatcher, and he thought, - correctly - that I would be interested to know. I checked back through my reports but could see no mention of Nuthatches and am now left wondering how he knew about my lack of sightings if I'd not written it in the EVN?

Anyway, it is good to know that they have been seen locally and it is worth keeping a lookout for them. An attractive bird, they are about the size of a Great Tit with a slate grey back and pinky front and a very pronounced black eye stripe.





They're often 'upside down' (as seen in the photo), working their way down a tree trunk, looking for insects and grubs in the bark.

Where they do occur more commonly, they are frequent visitors to bird feeders




Another bird occupying a similar niche is the Treecreeper, smaller and less brightly coloured than the Nuthatch, they also search for insects in tree bark - but their habit is to always go up the tree.

They will fly down to the base and then work their way up the tree looking for food. Occurring locally wherever there are established trees — I have seen them in the recreation ground in Church Street on a few occasions- they are rather mouse like when scurrying up the tree.

Our account closed in March 2021 and a total of £194.72 was transferred by a cheque to our Treasurer, Rob Bishop. He proposed that we could use some of this money to organise an Eastry NHW event to publicise the work of the organisation. He will retain the money until Covid-19 restrictions are lifted and we can relaunch Eastry NHW.

"Alert" NHW Reports: Simon Dundas will put "Alert" messages on the most appropriate forum website so they they are easily available to Eastry villagers.

**AOB:** Rob Bishop recommended using a plastic box to store parcels left outside a front door. This would help to prevent theft. Many people in the village do not know who is their local Eastry NHW member to contact if they have a query. Simon Dundas suggested that Eastry NHW members should be asked to provide their NAME and STREET, so they can help local residents. The meeting finished at 11.45 am.

#### **WARNING - Do not burn treated wood!**

Do not burn treated wood. Determine if the wood is treated because it usually contains stains or dyes in different shades of green or brown. Today, CCA (Chromated Copper Arsenate) treated wood is no longer sold in residential settings, however, it may still available in older buildings or structures.

This type of wood should not be burned. In many places, burning treated wood is illegal because treated wood releases carcinogenic and toxic components to the air which can seriously annoy your neighbours!. These harmful substances can also affect the groundwater by ash leaching with dioxins and arsenic.



#### **Overgrown vegetation in Eastry**

Eastry Parish Council are concerned that the village is very overgrown with vegetation at the moment. We urge parishioners to report overgrown footpaths to KCC by using the 'Report a problem on a right of way' tool on the KCC website (kent.gov.uk) and overgrown areas that DDC are responsible for (such as the village Car Park next to the Vet practice, DDC housing areas, DDC garages, bank along Gore Lane) to Dover District Council (dover.gov.uk), it is well hidden on the DDC website go to 'Parking and Streets', 'Report a problem', 'Parks and open spaces', Begin this form.

In the meantime the Parish Councilors have started to cut back the vegetation themselves, along the road in Church Street and the trees overhanging the Recreation Ground and are getting quotes to trim the trees in the Recreation ground and around the streetlights in the Gun Park. We would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone that if you have a hedge and it is on the boundary of a footpath or road, it is your responsibility to cut the outside that grows over the footpath or road.
