Please promote the initiative within your social circles where possible, We would love to get to that 1 million mark!


Scam Marshals on the BBC

Scam Text Messages

Recent research by the UK's telecoms regulator has revealed that almost 45 million people received at least one scam text or call in the last three months.

Landline calls continued to be a threat for older people, with 61% of over-75s saying they had received a potential scam call.

"Stay alert to any unsolicited contact. Put the phone down if you have any suspicion that it is a scam call, and don't click on any links in text messages you're unsure about." — Ofcom spokesperson

Online shopping fraud









- If you're purchasing goods and services from a company or person you don't know and trust, carry out some research first. Look up reviews of the company and ask trusted friends and family members if they have heard of it before
- Be wary of unsolicited emails and texts offering questionably good deals, and never respond to messages that ask for your personal and financial details.
- Avoid paying for goods and services by bank transfer as that offers you little protection
 if you become a victim of fraud. Instead, use a credit card or payment service such as
 PayPal if possible.
