The club's end of the year meeting/American supper despite being numerically restricted due to the last minute government guide lines was still a very enjoyable evening. It was very obvious that all the members present had arrived with a more than adequate supply of food and drinks. Mind you there are plenty of other seeds that you can start off indoors earlier than that - tomatoes , cucumbers, peppers and aubergines for example.

I guess that will be sufficient for now so I am off for a nice glass or two of the "falling over" liquid and a peaceful night. Best wishes to you all.

What is Dover District Council doing about climate change?

Dover District Council has acknowledged the serious impact of climate change globally and in our everyday lives. The Council declared a Climate Change Emergency recognising the need for urgent action. Outlined below are some of the current/ most recent initiatives and actions it has taken to reduce emissions:-

The Council has Grants/Schemes available to help residents in receipt of certain benefits, or on a low income with a vulnerability to living in a cold home (age/ health conditions) to improve the energy efficiency and increase the heat retention of their homes which decreases the need for energy and as a consequence reducing carbon emissions. More information can be found on the Council's website (https://www.dover.gov.uk/Environment/Energy-Advice/Grant-Schemes.aspx), or by calling 01304 872414.

New council housing built in the district will include solar Photovoltaics (PV), electric heating and provide additional insulation. These measures will significantly reduce the environmental impact of the developments and help reduce the long-term heating costs for the tenants.

The Council's Green Energy Grant Scheme is available for local businesses to help small businesses save carbon, become more energy efficient and save money. Recently DDC has given a grant of almost £10,000 towards the cost of new solar panels at a local farm shop.

Following a successful funding bid to the Office for Zero Emission Vehicles (OZEV), 49 electric vehicle charging points have been installed across the district (in car parks and on-street). A new fleet of electric buses will operate on Dover Fastrack when it's launched in 2023, which will become Fastrack Kent's first zero-emission bus service. Key works have been given the go ahead at St Margaret's Bay to help boost sea defences and continue to protect the area for the future.

Kearsney Abbey and Russell Gardens owned and managed by DDC have been awarded The Green Flag Award, in recognition of the enhancement of wildlife habitats, re-planting the orchard, and the provision of facilities for people to learn about parkland heritage and biodiversity. The Council celebrated National Tree Week by planting native trees to create a woodland walk at North Deal recreation ground. The trees offset the manufacture of 25 eco dog waste bins installed across the district by DDC. A further 14 trees gifted to the district from the Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St.Andrews following the 149th Open at Royal St George's have also been planted in Sandwich, at a community garden in Aylesham and Kearsney Parks adding to the 63 new fruit trees planted recently.

DDC will continue to take action to reduce emissions over which it has control and influence to meet the ambition of becoming a net zero emitter by 2030 and to support the district to become carbon neutral by 2050.

Year round Recipes

Lentil Dhal

1 tablspn vegetable oil 1 large onion finely chopped
1 garlic clove peeled and grated
1 inch of peeled root ginger grated
2 teaspn Garam Masala
Level teaspn of ground cinnamon
400g tin of chopped tomatoes
400g tin of coconut milk 150 ml of vegetable stock
250g of red lentils Juice of 1 lemon
A good handful of baby spinach or shredded chard
1 finely chopped carrot

METHOD

Gently saute the onion in the oil until soft
Add the ginger, garlic and spices for a minute or two
Add the tinned tomatoes, coconut milk and stock
Stir before adding the lentils and carrot
Simmer for about 20 minutes, check that the carrot and
lentils are soft

Add the lemon juice and spinach/chard

Serve as a side dish or with rice or naan breads as a main.





Current Scams

Here are a few of the current scams in circulation nationally and internationally:

- Door-to-door scam where a visitor claims to be from the Health Authority to test you for Covid-19. You do not have to open your door to anyone you don't know and aren't expecting.
- Telephone scam where someone claiming to work for the police, hospital, a bank
 or other service cold calls and says they are raising money or require payment for
 a local cause or service. Never respond to an unexpected call by giving
 away cash, cards, PINs, bank details or personal information no matter how tempting or convincing the caller may seem.
- Text or Email scams asking you to click on a link in order to obtain a Covid Passport and requesting payment and/or asking for your personal and financial data.
 Remember Covid Passports are free of charge and the NHS would never request a payment or ask for financial/personal data.
- Text and email scams claiming to be from HMRC, saying you are eligible for a tax refund. Never click a link or give out your bank details or personal information in response to an unsolicited email or text – no matter how tempting or convincing the message may seem.
- Text and email scams offering a separate covid test for Omicron, which requests
 that you click on a link and then requests a payment and/or personal and financial data. Remember Covid PCR and Lateral flow tests are free of charge
 from the NHS and they would never request a payment or ask for
 personal/financial data.

If you receive a suspicious email then forward to report@phishing.gov.uk and suspicious text messages to 7726 (SPAM).

Never **assume** or **believe** a message or offer is genuine – always **confirm** by contacting a trusted number or team like Action Fraud, a family member, friend or your bank's fraud department to check.

Report scams at <u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u> – and contact your bank's fraud team straight away if any money or bank details have been handed over.

There was no lull in crime over the Christmas period - someone started the new year by having their blue badge stolen. Obtaining a blue badge for the disabled is no easy matter and it is a very precious document that allows the disabled to retain a degree of independence. The disabled parking places are invaluable as the extra space allows for car doors to be opened fully and also allows for wheelchairs to be unloaded at the rear. Our Honey Bees - Ray Checksfield

My bees are all tucked up in their cluster and keeping warm, I hope. (Another two months before I can open the hive for a little look). It is early January. We are in a cold snap and it is a lovely change from the wet and dismal December. Bees can cope with the cold but not damp conditions. I do visit my bees once a week, just to check to see that they are all standing and no damage from woodpeckers etc.

This winter I have found a 'tame' robin in among my hives. Over the 60 odd years that I have kept bees I have found many tame robins on many apiary sites and have food on hand to feed them. Other bee keepers have had the same experience. When I had my bees at the late Mr Jack Bones farm at Selson, that one would feed from my hand and fly onto my bee hat for food. Made me jump. I hope this one now gets as tame as that.

The bee smoker is a vital implement in keeping bees. Its just a small bellows type tool with a spout. This makes the bees panic and they then gorge themselves with honey, thinking they have to vacate the hive and like us ,when we have a full tummy, we are very friendly just like the bees.? I never attempt to go near bees without my smoker chuffing away. Years ago we all used rolled up corrugated paper as fuel but then that became a no no, as it had weird chemicals added. Dangerous to the bees. I then went on to dead and dry wood gathered from the woods but the best fuel that I have ever used was dried flowers from the Sumach Tree.

Over the years we have often walked past the allotments in our village and noticed the Sumach trees in the corner smothered in these flowers. Too hard to get in and pick them sadly. Then, this year, hey presto, some new allotments right beside them. So, anyone on the new allotment site. I could be grovelling to you for the flowers this autumn. Swap for a jar of honey?

Gardening on the other side of the fence (5)

The winter lull in the garden gives a gardener a chance to take stock. We are looking forward to our second Spring in Eastry so I thought I would give a summary of the garden and the plantings and changes we have made in our first year. A new wildlife-friendly hedge is establishing well along an internal boundary fence. It is made up of mixed native hedging plants which can be bought very cheaply as young whips, 64 in all – 50% Hawthorn plus Spindle; Wild Privet; Hornbeam; Field Maple and Dog Rose. Using native plants will provide more food for local birds – more insects in the spring for foraging parents and berries during the colder months and, maybe, some new nesting opportunities.

15 new trees, or large shrubs will be the structural future of the garden. 4 Silver Birch (2 native saplings l'd collected) and 2 Betula jacquemontii (the ones with the very white bark) and a Chinese Red Birch; one new apple tree (Jupiter); three crab apples (Red Sentinel and Golden Hornet and one wilder variety); two varieties of Amelanchier; a Cornus Kousa, 2 "Red Cascade" spindles (Euonymus europaeus) and a Rowan. A good collection of hazels, cobnuts and berry plants (redcurrants; gooseberries; chokeberry; chuckleberry) will provide the understory in and around the existing apple trees. Further ground cover planting under these is made up of comfrey; wild strawberry and sweet violets. This multi-layered approach is the focus of "Forest Gardening", a relatively recent trend in food growing that also benefits the ecology of your garden.

A more relaxed, less "tidy" garden is being widely promoted in the gardening media and, both in horticulture and farming, much more research is being undertaken into soil science and health. The more of the year that you have something growing or keeping your soil covered with mulches of leaves; woodchips etc the healthier your soil will be. Not digging and allowing natural processes to take over means increases in worms and soil microlife which in turn helps hold onto more water and nutrients. With the help of an enthusiastic daughter, here for a few weeks in the summer, we dug and installed a new pond. The spoil has been neatly stacked in a sunny corner and will be a "beetle bank", offering a habitat for these beneficial predators to hide. I have also converted an inherited wooden compost bin into a hedgehog and amphibian hibernaculum. The bottom has a covered area for hedgehogs to nest in and this is surrounded by some builder's rubble and topped with shrub prunings to provide as wide a variety of nooks and crannies as possible for newts or slow worms and maybe, bumblebees to nest in.

The last major addition is the provision of dead wood, either as log piles or longer sections used as a border edge in the less formal area of the garden. You can do this very neatly and will increase the biodiversity of your garden at the same time.

I will be giving a talk to Eastry Horticultural Society on March 8th so hope to meet some of you there. Enjoy your 2022 gardening year.



Beacon View Vets Update

Hi everyone! We sincerely hope that you had a relaxing and slightly more normal Christmas than last year?

We saw an amazing response to our Christmas Charity appeal, with lots of generous donations for Cats Protection: Deal and District Branch and Retired Greyhounds Canterbury. We have been overwhelmed by the generosity of our clients and know that your gifts will be much appreciated by these deserving charities.



Sadly we have been seeing a lot of cases of a nasty parasite called Giardia. Giardia is a parasite that attacks the lining of the intestines and causes very watery, strong smelling diarrhoea. It can infect older dogs, but more frequently infects puppies and makes them feel rather unwell. Dogs become infected when they swallow Giardia that may be present in water or other substances that have been soiled with faeces.

If you suspect that your pet may have Giardia we have a rapid test that we can run in our laboratory to confirm the infection. Fortunately there are effective treatments to combat the disease but it is very easy for dogs to reinfect themselves. Giardia can be passed to humans so it is important to practice good hygiene if your pet becomes infected.

We would also like to say a very warm welcome to three new team members that have joined us since we last updated you. Tessa joined us in January and brings our vet team up to five, she has two dogs of her own named Rufus and Vino. We were also delighted to welcome two new nurses to the team before Christmas. Emma lives in Sandwich with her fiancé, and lurcher Dingo. Gemma joins us with 21 years of experience as an RVN and is kept busy by her two daughters and Border Terrier Woody.

37 **Rewilding**

It is generally accepted that, overall, British farming is amongst the most efficient in the world. It is also an established fact that wildlife in the UK is among the most degraded anywhere. Sadly these two facts are causally linked. To produce the maximum of food per hectare of land requires large fields, growing monocultures, requiring the intensive use of fertilisers and pesticides. There is no place in such a regime for hedges, woods, ponds or any non economically productive areas. The result is massive loss of farmland wildlife. The almost complete absence of skylarks, yellowhammers and corn buntings, iconic farmland birds, in many areas symbolise this loss. It can all be rapidly reversed. I have surveyed a 1 km square close to Eastry for breeding birds for years. In one field I have recorded one, occasionally two skylarks each year until one year the crop failed early and was abandoned to natural regrowth. I recorded five skylarks!

Rewilding is carried out mostly on failing agricultural land. It involves human interventions, blocking field drains, restoring natural waterways, dykes, ponds etc and initial animal introductions. These may be mammals which once lived in the area but have long been locally extinct; wild boar, beavers, pine martens, otters, even bison, hardy cattle, like English Longhorns, Highland and Belted Galloway breeds and sometimes hardy Konic ponies. These grazing animals help create uneven, tussocky plant growth, perfect for, among other species, ground nesting birds, providing cover for nests in the tussocks and shorter vegetation between for feeding. Bird re-introductions include red kite, cranes, white storks, sea eagles and ospreys. Following these initial interventions the area is left overwhelmingly untouched for natural regeneration of plants and animals. The aim is to create a web of such areas across the country providing a network of corridors for wildlife linking more formally managed nature reserves.

Critics of such schemes lament loss of food production 'requiring more imports of food', but many of these areas are lamentably poor for food growth. One classic example is that of hill sheep farming, a feature of many upland areas of the country. Such farmers invariably make a loss as poor soils support little grass growth so sheep numbers are severely limited. They are dependent upon government funding to survive but also are tempted to graze too many sheep on the hill, leading to destruction of the grazing and soil erosion. Rewilding here allows growth of scrub and mixed, native woodland, rich in plant and animal species.

Criticism is also as to how anyone can afford to introduce such schemes, but, as listeners to 'The Archers' will know, provision of camping and 'glamping' facilities and charging admission along marked paths do provide sources of income. The government plans subsidies to encourage such schemes to replace the old EU agricultural subsidy systems.

Should you wish to see all this first hand a visit to the Knepp castle estate in West Sussex is fascinating and they have a variety of websites explaining their activities. Enjoy.

Bird Watching with Big Nick

Happy New Year to everyone, let's hope it is an improvement on 2020 and 2021!

My latest 'grab your camera' moment was for a bird we rarely see in the UK, a White Stork — apart from a recent reintroduction project in West Sussex only about 20 are recorded each year. This one turned up on Worth Marshes before Christmas and is still showing well at the time of writing. It is most likely to have stopped off here on migration rather than a locally raised bird as it has no leg rings or wing tags, indicative of a bird 'from the wild'.





However, before the Stork appeared I'd already decided that I was going to write about some much smaller birds, in fact the UKs smallest birds. The Goldcrest is usually quoted as the smallest, weighing in at 5 to 7g or to put that in perspective, somewhere between the weights of a 20p and 2p coin. The closely related Firecrest is on average just a little larger, but there's not much in it.

The Goldcrest – (formerly inaccurately known as



Gold Crested Wren) are widespread and common throughout the UK but their tiny size means they are often overlooked. They particularly favour coniferous and yew trees and good places to look for them are in churchyards and parks (Kearsney Abbey gardens are usually a very good place to look). Their call and song are very high pitched and many people can't hear them, but if you are fortunate enough to be able to, this will often alert you to their presence.

Goldcrest – when displaying, the crest can be raised and appears much brighter and larger

The very similar Firecrest (it's most obvious distinguishing feature is a bright white line above the eye, which is not present in Goldcrests) is a recent arrival in the UK. They were first recorded breeding in Hampshire in 1962 but can now be found in coniferous forest in much of south-east England though in very small numbers. The call and song are similar to the Goldcrest, and it may be a bit difficult to tell them apart. Many birds arrive in the UK from Europe in the winter, so this is a good time to look out for them; one or two usually turn up at The Elms, the small wooded reserve at Sandwich Bay.

My hair stayed dead straight even though I ate my crusts and there's never been a fruit tree growing inside me after I swallowed a few stones. My brother was told to eat his greens to 'put hairs on his chest' but I ate them too! If I drank vinegar my blood would dry up and I was in danger of falling over my bottom lip if I sulked.

After all that the only thing she was right about was if I pulled a funny face and the wind changed I would stay like it. Now I defy anyone who has read this not to recall all the things your mother told you....oh and watching too much TV will make your eyes go square!

So sad.

Closer to my heart at this moment is that Alzheimers and Dementia are such sad and cruel things that deeply affects both the sufferer and their families. A very dear friend Ron, who I have known since I was seven years old when we went to school and Sunday School together, who became a lay preacher at the same local church is suffering from Alzheimers disease. We have kept in touch on and off over the years and periodically I would go to his church to listen to his beautiful sermons.

Roy was a lovely listener, a true confidante and, more importantly, a truly loyal friend. Due to Covid we have only been able to speak on the phone and gradually I got this feeling that something was not quite right - it was funny when he called me his "little old lady friend who lives in Eastry" - yes it is funny but not when it's said five times in a ten minute conversation - alarm bells started to ring and I was very concerned about him. Sadly his son confirmed that he had this awful illness and this really touched my heart.

My heart goes out to anyone who is "with this" at the moment but, let's hope that for the person suffering from it that 'ignorance is bliss' but for their loved ones and friends I would like to say my heart is with you and God bless you all.
