Eastry Horticultural Society - Eastry Gardeners

Despite the vicious winds and torrential rains we are here, already deep in to yet another year of enjoyment, finally being able to seriously start our favourite 'at home job' of gardening. As the years slip away for many of us our physical capabilities may start to struggle but fortunately our enthusiasm never fails. Writing loosely of age I must confess that since the last notes I have had my knuckles lightly rapped in a very friendly way for actually suggesting that our Lady Chairman was merely 'youngish', when in fact at 25 and a few bits she really is on the young side! The Society and the villagers owe heartfelt thanks to both the Dover District Council and to the Eastry Parish Council for their generous grants to cover the cost of the splendid and much needed trees for planting with their follow-up care carried out free of charge by volunteers of the Eastry HS headed by Trev. Fortunately the trees have all 'taken' well and are already showing healthy signs of spring.

Our first meeting in 2022 took place in February with a few minutes of 'correspondence' followed by a very enjoyable guiz evening - compered by 'young' Jackie, with marking by an even younger Lynn, well done ladies. The kitchen team and the stewards were efficient and much appreciated. The eventual quiz winners, after a close contest, was the 'tulip' table consisting of Glynn, Wendy, Marion, Geoff, Sandra and Methuselah's brother. At tea break the seed potatoes for the club's pot grown competition were handed out, grow them how you think best in the club supplied pot. Although we are the Horticultural Club we do of course have an equally important and very successful Flower and Flower Arranging section as well as a superb Domestics section, which covers cooking, sewing, handicraft etc. and a photography section. In fact we have something for everyone, why not come and join us? Our March meeting was headed by Jeff Davis giving what turned out to be a very interesting and important talk on 'Gardening for the Bees'. April 12th is our Spring show and is part of the normal meeting but will also include the competition for the daffodils grown from the bulbs previously supplied by the club. May 10th is another very interesting talk on Wild Flowers by Sue Buckingham, and new members are always very welcome.

Hopefully all of your winter pruning of trees, shrubs and hedges should have been completed. If not be very careful as many of our birds and beneficial insects are looking for nesting sites and don't forget to leave a hedgehog highway if possible. Broad beans, french beans, chard, kale, lettuce and rocket can all be started outdoors along with onion sets and nicely chitted early potatoes. A tasty tip, eat your broad beans before they get too large, they really are at their best whilst 'new'. There are many other items that you can now start off, but if you feel that you need some help there are excellent folk in the club who will willingly help you.

Have you ever tried growing then eating freshly cut Kohl Rabi. Back in 1949 I, with my classmates, was studying agriculture at college and we were testing what was then a 'new' plant. If you do grow it try eating it raw fresh from the garden, it tastes just like a rather nice ice cream. Several garden products like carrots, peas, even brussels and others taste excellent if eaten raw, straight from the garden.

Eastry Parish Council - Dog Fouling

Please make sure that you clear up after your dog. Eastry Parish Council are concerned that there has recently been an increase in dog fouling incidents and the Dog Warden is now carrying out regular patrols in the village and issuing penalty tickets. Apart from the obvious unpleasant effects of dog fouling there are potential health risks. Dogs can be affected by several types of worm, one of which can cause serious illness in children.

It is extremely important that you:

Clear dog mess from public places and your own garden
Worm your dog every 6 months
Wash your hands after playing with dogs
Try to train your dog to go at home
and take a plastic bag and poop scoop when you go out

It is an offence for any person in charge of a dog not to remove any faeces deposited by a dog in their charge. Anyone found guilty of an offence will be issued with a fixed penalty notice (currently £100 fine reduced to £75 if paid within 10 days). This gives an opportunity to discharge liability to prosecution. Should the fine not be paid, or offences be persistent Dover District Council may prosecute with a maximum fine of £1000.

Year Round Recipes

Easter Biscuits

Makes 24 biscuits using a 6cm cutter.

Preheat oven 200C/180 fan/gas 6 and line baking trays with baking paper.

100g softened unsalted butter 75g caster sugar

1 medium egg separated Grated zest of a lemon

200g plain flour 50g currants A little milk.

METHOD

Beat the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy - Add the egg yoke and lemon zest - Sift in the flour and mix in well.

Stir in the currants - Add enough milk to make a soft dough, at this point the dough can be chilled for 15 minutes.

Flour the worktop and knead the dough, roll out the dough to about 5mm and using the 6mm cutter cut out the biscuits, place on baking sheets and bake for 8 minutes.

Meanwhile beat the egg white well - Once the biscuits are out of the oven brush with the egg white and sprinkle with a little caster sugar. Put back into oven for about 5 minutes until golden brown and leave on the trays until cool.

Eastry Village Hall Update 2022

In May 2020 Robin Bishop (Treasurer of the Eastry Village Hall Management Committee) penned an article in this magazine reflecting upon the historical foundation of the trust to oversee the use of the Village Hall "for the purposes of physical and mental recreation and moral and intellectual development". We were only a couple of months into the first wave of



Covid and the subsequent lack of social activity which only served to emphasise the decline in the use of the hall by the community it was in place to serve.

A delayed AGM last October saw the retirement of the then chairman Mitchell Ferrier who had served the community tirelessly during his time in office. He was replaced by Andrew Stanford and at the same time Robin's appeal for new blood within the trustees was also answered and a re-energised team set about a program of improvements to repair and update the amenities on offer.

To date work has been completed to maintain or improve the fabric of the building and make it a safe and pleasant environment including a complete upgrade to the central heating system, the installation of a new hearing loop & sound system, repainting of several areas and safety work to the outbuildings.

With the easing of Covid restrictions our Village Hall is once again fully open and providing facilities for a wide range of activities. Local organisations and clubs hold meetings, shows and fairs there. A wide range of dance & exercise classes are available as well as a theatre group, indoor bowls, whist drives, craft fairs, bingo, jumble sales and quiz nights. The snooker club is open 5 evenings per week and is open for membership. The hall is also a perfect space for family celebrations, birthday parties, weddings and other events.

Activities at the hall can be found in Eastry Village News as well as on posters in local shops and notice boards throughout the district. Current Scams

The three storms that recently hit Kent have highlighted the need for residents to be aware of rogue traders who will use this as an opportunity to inflate costs for substandard work. For example an elderly gentleman was charged over £3000 for roof repairs that were of a poor standard and took four hours to complete. When he tried to withdraw the cash from his bank, they became concerned and referred the case to me for verification. Working together with KCC Trading Standards, Kent Police, the bank and a reputable builder the work was discredited, and no money was paid. Trading Standards continue to investigate the case.

Choosing a reputable, reliable and trusted tradesman can be difficult particularly if you live alone and the repair is urgent, however keep calm and use the ABC of scam prevention: **Never Assume**, **Never Believe**, **Always Confirm**.

Please consider the following factors: Is the repair covered by house insurance? If so, report and follow their advice. Discuss the repair with a relative, neighbour or friend and seek personal recommendations. Do not be reluctant to ask for advice.

Local and reliable tradesmen often obtain their work through recommendations. It is good business for them to build this trust. Obtain an estimate in writing. Three estimates are recommended however any written estimate is unlikely for an urgent repair. Does the estimate include VAT? If so, the trader must be VAT registered with HMRC. The VAT number should be identified on a written estimate. Avoid cash transactions of large sums of money as it has no audit trail. Most legitimate tradesmen and companies should accept other forms of payment.

Do not accept advice from tradesmen randomly calling at your home. Make an appointment with a legitimate tradesman who are always willing to provide free advice and estimates, with no pressure to accept. Do not be reluctant to ask questions no matter how basic. Stay in control of the situation. It is your home, your money and your decision.

KCC Trading Standards Checked are the only traders vetted by Kent Trading Standards. Details are available on-line with Kent residents also receiving an information leaflet. If you do not have Internet access contact Ask a Kent Librarian on 03000 416438 (office hours Monday to Saturday). They will access the Internet and search on your behalf. If you still feel unsure having considered the above, please contact me for advice.

I am unable to recommend specific tradesmen but will listen and provide guidance and support where necessary. Stay safe and enjoy the Spring and Summer months.

I have been an ordinary member of the NHW committee for a while and we all get reports form the police on crime. Luckily we do not get much crime in Eastry compared to some places although some crime will be occurring but not be reflected in the figures. Most of us will encounter attempted cyber crime when we use our PCs, tablets, and phones.

The Kent Fraud Alert System has informed us of emails impersonating the NHS. I had one telling me to click a link to obtain a new Covid passport. Be aware that the NHS etc. will never send a message asking you to click on a link and disclose personal and financial details. If you receive a suspicious text message, then forward to 7726.

If you think that you may have been a victim of this type of scam, then contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud at www.actionfraud.police.uk or by calling **0300 123 2040.**



It is worth downloading the Country Eye app to your phone to enable you to report various types of crime such as:

Animal/Wildlife Crime, Farm Crime, Trespass and Fly Tipping.

I reported fly tipping yesterday and it is so quick. From within the app I took a photo of the rubbish and the location was automatically added using the phones location.

Look for this logo. If you see anything suspicious or have been the target of fraud best report it to help keep everyone safe.



Easter greetings, We are all familiar with the Easter story, but I am reminded of the moment in the garden, outside the empty tomb where Jesus says to Mary Magdalene, 'Why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' I feel these questions are even more poignant this year as our Lenten journey has

coincided with the heart-breaking and deeply worrying war in Ukraine.

Our hearts are heavy as we witness the pain and suffering of millions of people, and feel helpless, with the injustice and futility of it all. I'm not sure what the situation will be at the time this magazine goes to print, but right now the situation in Ukraine seems to many, to be hopeless.

The question, 'Why are you weeping?' may help us to focus our sadness and lament at the hope-lessness of this conflict, and also other global crises. 'Why are you weeping?' We weep because of loss, fear and helplessness, injustice, and suffering. Mary has lost her teacher, her leader, her friend. She weeps for what has happened to her and to the one she has loved. Jesus then asks, 'For whom are you looking?' The tomb is now empty – the broken body placed there 2 days before, is now gone. The stone has been rolled away and only remnants of grave clothes remain.

I wonder if another question might be appropriate for us, this Easter season, 'For what are we looking?' I would also like to offer an answer – an antidote to our feelings of helplessness and grief. Maybe it is hope that we need to search for. Hope is not about being eternally optimistic.... but it always beckons us forward on our journey of life and faith. Hope is that tiny flickering flame of a candle on the darkest nights, hope is the beautiful yellow daffodils shining radiantly, even when the sky is grey, and storms are raging overhead. Hope is not wishful thinking, not gritting our teeth and 'hoping for the best', but hope stares at the reality and finds goodness in the midst of evil, and love in the midst of hate. If nothing else, this is what the cross and resurrection teach us.

Death and suffering do not have the last word- love and life win every time. Hope embraces the whole of reality; it gives courage and provides affirmation for the future. I encourage you, this Easter, to reflect on these questions;

'Why are you weeping?' 'For what are you looking?' I pray that you will seek and search, and find hope amidst the turmoil of this, our beautiful but broken world.

Gardening on the other side of the fence (5)

Spring is well and truly under way and hopefully, enjoying our gardens gives us some respite from the incredibly gloomy events taking place in Ukraine. It is sometimes hard to stay focused on the minor trials and tribulations of our daily interests and hobbies during such times. However I am pleased to report that the trend towards greener gardening continues to gain momentum.



The Royal Horticultural Society have just announced that slugs and snails will no longer be classified as pests. The society is undergoing an important re-brand and will now seek to change the gardening public's perception of the role gardens provide in these times of climate change and biodiversity crisis. Advice from professional horticulturalists has always focused to how to kill much of the wildlife that shares our green spaces and the RHS now wants to promote a more understanding attitude to how we deal with our gardening problems. Many of us want to see nesting birds, hedgehogs, frogs and toads visiting our gardens but we also have a tendency to spend our time and money eradicating their natural food sources. 'Pests' such as earwigs may nibble your dahlias, but research has shown they are voracious eaters of aphids and are now being actively reintroduced to apple orchards. Now no one is going to convince a grower of prize-winning hostas to turn a blind eye to the damage slugs and snails can do, so it will take a generational change to alter our approach to what we want from our gardens. (Note - the owner of the national collection of Hostas says she only uses garlic spray to protect her plants). Because of the prominence of bug sprays and slug pellets being displayed in supermarkets and garden centres, I often meet new gardeners who think they can't grow anything without resorting to these products. Waitrose and Co-op have already declared they will discontinue stocking these chemicals and requests to the others to follow suit are underway. You can find out more on Pesticide Action Network UK's website.

My garden and those that I work in, are lush, varied and interesting and there is not a jot of chemical intervention being applied. But I'm also not putting in lines of marigolds and lettuce seedlings, so I fully appreciate the conundrum. (Actually I did put in a row of Salad Bowl and Lollo Rosso lettuce last year, and they all got eaten except one of the red ones. So I let it go to seed and have saved the seed to re-sow this spring. I will report back!) But I do have an extremely healthy crop of Winter Density lettuce cropping right now. And we had climbing beans, tomatoes, beetroot, potatoes, chard, kale, leeks, courgette and sweetcorn in our first year in this garden, so it can be done.

Lastly, they say "If you build it, they will come". Well, not yet they haven't. The new pond has attracted no breeding frogs. My neighbours counted 34. Patience, patience...... Enjoy your 2022 gardening year,



Hi everyone! We recently celebrated our second birthday which was somewhat surreal. It has been amazing to look back on the last two years and see how much we have grown despite the terrible pandemic. Whilst looking through your pet's coat each day can reduce the risk, the young ticks are sometimes as small as sesame seeds which makes them almost impossible to reliably find amongst all the fluff. We are able to offer a range of products to help prevent tick bites and would discuss everything with you to find the best option for you and your pet.

Unfortunately due to climate change and international pet travel there are now new tick-borne diseases in the UK which can cause life-long disease and be potentially fatal so we strongly advise preventing any tick bites.

In Praise of SOIL

The year 1976 saw a very hot, dry summer. In late September driving in the lanes of rural Suffolk we found a lane completely blocked by a DRIFT, of topsoil. Upwind was a huge field. Its cereal crop had been harvested and the field ploughed and harrowed. The exposed soil, powdery and dry had simply blown away. In the 1990's, then living in Deal I would take the dog along the Mongeham Brooks, below the salad fields of Finglesham area. After heavy rain the brook would often change its course, with huge muddy banks of topsoil washed down from the salad fields. So, does this matter? Yes. Soil is often disregarded, dismissed as 'dirt', 'ground', even 'mud', but it is essential to the growth of all plants on land and these are, in turn, essential sources of food energy for all animal life, including ours.

How? What IS soil? It is a complex mixture of 1, the physical: rock fragments, sand, silt and clay in declining order of size, water, dissolved mineral salts and

air. 2, Dead organic matter, such as leaves and dead animals of all sizes and humus, which is partly decayed dead stuff, forming a dark sticky goo. This sticks together the rock fragments so a healthy soil has a crumb structure, a bit like breadcrumbs. This allows air and water to circulate between the crumbs. 3, Living organisms, worms and tiny insects and bacteria and fungi in unimaginable numbers. These bring about the decay of dead matter, forming the humus that gives



the soil its structure, then, ultimately, releasing mineral salts from it. Worms, insects and moles also **aerate** the soil, creating tunnels from the surface allowing air deep into the soil.

Soil provides: **anchorage** for plants, **water** the plant takes up through its roots, **oxygen** from the air in the soil allows the roots to respire and release energy, which they use to take up **mineral salts**. These the plant combines with sugars made by **photosynthesis** to produce **oils**, **for energy storage** and **proteins** mainly forming the **skeleton** for plant cells and **catalysts** (**enzymes**) to regulate the **metabolism** (**'workings'**) of the plant.

What can damage a soil? 1, Becoming waterlogged. This results from rainfall, particularly in clay soils as the water sticks around the billions of individual particles. Waterlogged soils lack oxygen (because it is not very soluble in water). This stops decay so the soil soon becomes depleted of minerals. It also becomes acid due to fermentation caused by bacteria which do not need oxygen. Very few types of plant can grow in these soils. 2, Drying out This happens most easily in sandy soils. Without water plants die. 3, Loss of crumb structure The soil becomes powdery and easily blows or washes away. This happens if the amount of humus in the soil declines. It results from use of chemical fertilisers (sources of mineral salts) rather than dead organic matter (manure etc.) in agriculture. Terry Wood.

Bird Watching with Big Nick

Spring is here again with all the expectations that it brings to most of us. The flowers and trees are bursting into life and for me it is the prospect of all the birds that visit us at this time of year, looking their best in their breeding plumage.

A subject I've not covered yet is ducks, the catchall name for the many species of waterfowl. There are at least 21 species in Britain, with a few species such as the Mandarin duck, which have escaped from captivity and colonised. Generally the male - or drake- is the showiest, with strong markings and bright colours. The females are often low key mottled shades of brown to help camouflage them whilst they are incubating their eggs. These can be more difficult to identify; perhaps a subject for a future column? For now I will concentrate on the drakes of some of our commoner species – all of the ones shown below were photographed locally.

Firstly, our smallest duck, the Teal; the winter population is around ten times that of the resident birds because large numbers arrive from the Baltic and Siberia. Hundreds have been known to over winter at Restharrow Scrape. Sandwich Bay in a good year. Both sexes show iridescent green wing patches (called speculum) but the male has a chestnut brown head with a green patch over the eye.







The Mallard is probably recognised by most people and is our commonest duck, present throughout the UK on just about any pond or stream. The Shoveler (so named because of its enormous bill, used for sifting food from the water) is far less common with fewer than a thousand pairs breeding in the UK, but like the other species numbers increase in winter from continental birds.







Tufted Duck Another attractively marked duck is the Wigeon. The males have a chestnut head and neck with a yellow forehead, pinkish chest and grey back. It is largely

a winter visitor with only about 400 pairs nesting in the UK, and that's mainly in the north. Of the six species illustrated, the Shelduck is the only one where the sexes are alike, although the females are a little smaller and the bill is paler. As these ducks nest underground in old rabbit burrows, it is less important to be camouflaged. Finally the Tufted Duck (so called because of the 'tuft' of feathers on the head). These look almost black and white, but in the right light the head can appear dark blue. They nest in lowland sites across most of the UK but are less common in Wales. There are several other species of duck that can be seen locally but these are generally rarer, and may be covered at some time in the future. Nick

This is an updated story of my 'undiscovered pigs'. My late husband Mic was a very good cartoonist and a member of the prestigious Cartoonists Club of Great Britain which, at that time, only had 200 selected members. Despite his winning many competitions around the globe we could never take the risk of him giving up his day job to create cartoons for a living - which was his dream.

In the late 80's I was looking after my young granddaughter for the day. She was watching Mick drawing when she asked, for some unknown reason, "Grandad, can you draw pigs?" and without hesitation Mic proceeded to draw some pigs. Later on I was having a tidy up when the pigs came to light again and from then on Mic seemed to draw more and more of them. I'd get annoyed - the house needed decorating, the garden needed doing and there was Mic, sitting in his "studio" (our shed!) which was becoming more of a sty every day. One day he said to me "Do you know Rose, I'm getting quite attached to these porkies".

He asked me if I could write a story about them. Now I always thought you wrote the story first and then added the illustrations so this seemed the wrong way round. At that time I worked full time as well as doing my once a week 'slot' on Radio Kent so the last thing I wanted to do after coming home was to write a book about pigs! However, to keep the peace, I did my best - I felt that if I had grown a snout and a curly tail I would have received more affection and attention - and eventually the book was completed with illustrations far more worthy than the text.

At that time TV presenter Esther Rantzen was covering 'cot death' on her programme 'That's Life' and as this was a subject close to our hearts Mic decided to send the book to her at the BBC who promptly lost it. Fortunately Mic had a spare copy which he sent to Claire Rayner at ITV. She wrote us a very nice letter saying it was very good but shared a 'similarity' to the film 'The Snowman'. Mic was furious, having never seen the film or read the story, and exclaimed loudly "My pigs have flown many more miles than that ruddy snowman knew how to and she should stick to commenting on hysterectomies".

Mic never gave up, I wondered if he had a fixation for Rosemary and Hazel in our Post Office as he was in and out of there so often! As Mic's health began to deteriorate the pigs were put on a back burner but towards the end of his life he asked me to do something about those pigs. I promised that I would but, I have to say with a more than guilty heart, that I never have. Just recently, at the ripe old age of 81, my heart has got the better of me so I must do something about it.

It is a lovely book for small children, worthy of space in any bookshop, but I cannot afford to self publish and I would need an agent to promote it to the stores but I do owe it to Mic. At the moment a copy is with David Walliams in the hope he will give it some sort of notoriety - so, as they say, watch this space.

PS - a few copies are on sale at Amazon thanks to my daughter in law. It is called 'Little Tom and his porkies' by Mic and Rose Beer.
