



Eastry CAN

Eastry CAN was founded in Autumn 2022 to look at ways of supporting the village through the cost-of-living crisis. Unfortunately, it appears that it will extend well into, and perhaps beyond, 2023. We have been successful in raising money with grants from Eastry Parish Council and the Sandwich Deanery of Church in Society, as well as private donations from Steve Manion, Effective Training Ltd and Select Technology Ltd, and individual donations at fund raising events. In total we have so far raised just over £2,000.

Our initial proposal is to distribute vouchers which can be used in Baitup Butchers, Bickers Post Office, The Baker's Dozen, Eastry Fish Bar, Infinitea Tea Shop and The Five Bells. Our goal is to work with partners such as social clubs, charities and the local schools and other services - we will provide them with the vouchers, and they can pass them on to households and individuals who may benefit. Importantly, Eastry CAN does not ask for verification, and we do not ask for names. We deliberately do not keep track of who receives the vouchers, only the partners we give them to and where they are spent. Giving out the vouchers, and spending them, is entirely confidential.

Each voucher is worth £6.50, meaning we have funding for around 300 vouchers, and we continue to seek funding through various channels including events and the Dover Lotto. If you'd like to know more, please come along to a group meeting - we meet on the third Sunday of every month in the Five Bells at 7.00pm.

Funding for Eastry CAN and the Short Mat Bowls Club

Two local organisations have been awarded £500 each from EPC to support good local initiatives.

Eastry CAN provides **free food vouchers** to support local residents grappling with the cost of living which can be spent in local shops - see page 16.

The Short Mat Bowls Club will use its funding to upgrade its outdated indoor equipment. They meet at the Village Hall, Fridays 7.00pm. Everyone welcome.

Local Plan

Consultation on the new Dover District Local Plan to 2040 closed in December. The Plan guides decisions on future development proposals across the district including setting aside land for housing. The Parish Council sent a flyer to every household in the village encouraging residents to make their views known. The Parish Council's role is to provide views on future planning applications in Eastry, however the final decisions are made by the DDC Planning Authority.

Highways Improvement Plan (HIP)

The HIP is used by the KCC highways authority to consult with Parish Councils for improvements required within the local area. Ideas for improvements are prioritised with information for KCC Highways to investigate and cost. The HIP is reviewed annually and often only 1 or 2 projects will be able to go ahead depending upon budget and agreement from KCC and any consultation required. The projects are funded either jointly, or by Eastry Parish Council or KCC.

This year is dominated by measures to tackle excessive speed and anti-social driving behaviour on the approaches to Eastry. We have also asked for 'dropped kerbs' outside the Village Hall to help elderly residents. If you have ideas on how to improve Eastry's local roads, please get in touch clerk@eastry-pc.gov.uk

Year Round Recipes - Meatballs and Pasta

INGREDIENTS

1 onion, finely chopped, 1 garlic clove, finely chopped,
200g Turkey mince (or any other type of mince), olive or sunflower oil
1 tin chopped tomatoes (400g), 150ml water, tbsn tomato purée,
large pinch of mixed herbs, any veg like mushrooms peppers/diced carrots
200g any type of dried pasta.

METHOD

- Mix some of the chopped onion and garlic with the mince. Shape into balls (golf ball size is about right). Heat the oil in a non-stick frying pan and brown the meatballs on all sides. Remove and put on to a plate. Add remainder of onion / garlic to pan and cook for a few minutes, don't allow to brown.
- 2. Add the tomatoes, tomato purée, herbs, mushrooms, peppers, diced carrots to the pan with 150ml water. Bring to the boil, then add the meatballs. Reduce the heat, cover with a lid and simmer for 30 minutes.

After about 20 minutes put pasta onto cook in boiling water, when cooked put into dishes, put meat balls on top and pour over sauce.

Hi everyone! We hope that you had a relaxing and slightly more normal Christmas than last year!

We saw an amazing response to our Christmas Charity appeal, with lots of generous donations for Cats Protection: Deal and District Branch and Retired Greyhounds Canterbury. We have been overwhelmed by the generosity of our clients and know that your gifts will be much appreciated by the charities.

Sadly we have been seeing a lot of cases of a nasty parasite called Giardia which is a parasite that attacks the lining of the intestines and causes very watery, strong smelling diarrhoea. It can infect older dogs, but more frequently infects puppies and makes them feel rather unwell. Dogs become infected when they swallow Giardia that may be present in water or other substances that have been soiled with faeces. If you suspect that your pet may have Giardia, we have a rapid test that we can run in our laboratory to confirm the infection. Fortunately there are effective treatments to combat the disease, but it is very easy for dogs to reinfect themselves. Giardia can be passed to humans so it is important to practice good hygiene if your pet becomes infected.

We would like to say a very warm welcome to three new team members who have joined us. Tessa joined us in January and brings our vet team up to five, she has two dogs of her own named Rufus and Vino. We were also delighted to welcome two new nurses to the team before Christmas. Emma lives in Sandwich with her fiancé and lurcher Dingo. Gemma joins us with 21 years of experience as an RVN and is kept busy by her two daughters and Border Terrier Woody.

Who Are We?

We are a relatively small but very active group who keep our ears to the ground for issues that might affect the Eastry community. We meet regularly and get information from various sources including daily police reports. Our contact details are at the front of this magazine.

How do we communicate issues

Through an email distribution list to members, in Eastry Village News, on Facebook's Eastry Community Watch page and by socialising at the free coffee mornings every other Friday in the village hall.

Latest News

Most recently there have been some thefts of motor vehicles and catalytic converters. Below is the latest from the police.

Theft of red Yamaha motorbike (YZF125, red) from Mill Green. A couple of catalytic converter thefts from cars in Sandwich and several stolen in Dover. Converters can be more valuable from hybrid cars.

To help prevent catalytic converter theft:

- 1. Park off the road else leave your car closer to kerbs or fences. Restrict access to the catalytic converter. If possible, it's even better to have the exhaust facing the side of the kerb. That will make it even tougher for thieves.
- 2. **Park in a well-lit area**. To make it much more visible to passers-by and surrounding properties, acting as a deterrent to potential thieves.
- 3. **Buy a catalytic converter clamp**. Toyota in particular offers some specifically designed clamps for some of its models, but plenty of aftermarket options are available too.
- 4. **Have your catalytic converter marked**. It's possible to have a serial number marked on your catalytic converter, which is designed to help identify it if stolen. As well as acting as a visual deterrent, it will also help scrapyards identify a stolen item.
- 5. **Have a garage weld the bolts**. If your car's catalytic converter is held on with screwed bolts, it's worth taking it to a garage to have them welded. This will make it much more difficult to remove for thieves requiring serious tools to cut the metal rather than simply unbolting it.
- 6. **Improve your home security**. If you park your car directly outside your house, investing in some security cameras and lights are a good way to help prevent theft. As well as giving you an extra eye over your car, simply having a camera on your home can act as a visual deterrent.

Gleaning in Eastry helps save food wastage

David Bradley of Selson Farm, Eastry estimates that around 15% of his fruit crop is typically left unharvested - too small, too big, too green or with too many marks to meet supermarket specifications even though the goodness of the fruit is just the same! This 10-16% wastage is an issue all over the UK and equates to up to 37,00 tonnes of food a year. This is why David invites the East Kent Gleaning Group on to his farm whenever he has a glut of apples, pears or cherries that he can't sell. He would much prefer his fruit to be eaten than be left to rot on the ground.

The experienced pickers of the East Kent Gleaning Group distribute the fruit they pick to those in need via community kitchens, food banks and primary schools across East Kent. Gleaning - the gathering of crops left over after the main harvest -dates back thousands of years. There are references to it in the Bible with God directing farmers to leave their "gleanings" for the poor as an act of charity. In this country, from around the 16th century, the rural poor relied upon gleaning to supplement their incomes and any leftover cereal crops were used for baking bread. Mechanisation saw gleaning tail off in the 20th century and it had disappeared by the 1950's but now it is back to help those in need and to help address the challenge of food waste.

Walter Bertram Durden (Wally) 1930-2022



The late Wally Durden was well known locally as the Treasurer for many local societies - Eastry Horticultural Society, Eastry Bowling Club, Wingham Short Mat Bowling Club and Eastry Art Club as well as making sure the local British Legion books were ready for approval. Born in 1930 in Walmer he was affectionately known as 'Juni' not only because he was the younger son but because at 5ft 6" tall he was always looking up to his elder brother at 6ft. He loved sport - he was the fastest runner in the school, played table-tennis, darts, snooker and, his favourite, lawn bowls.

He had various jobs before ending up working for the National Coal Board where he decided to improve his chances of promotion by going to Night School to learn Accountancy. This is where he met the love of his life, Roz, who he married in Eastry Church in 1952. In 1955 Trish was born and in 1957 they rented a brand new Council house at 35 Cooks Lea, Eastry where they set up their home. Bridgette arriving in 1959 to complete their family unit.

One of his jobs at the Coal Board was to collect the wages. He would travel in a Police convoy to collect the money and return to his office to count it out - a huge task and responsibility. Not so glamorous was the job to collect the rents from the miners houses. In the 1970's he was promoted to the prestigious post of auditor of the National Coal Board. He had some lucky escapes - during the Second World War he was walking down a street in Walmer when a Nazi plane fired a hail of bullets at him. A passing man grabbed him in time and pulled him into a shop doorway. On another occasion he was on a train at Betteshanger Colliery when the driver shouted "Jump" to Wally as the train was beginning to derail. He jumped from the train, expertly rolled and got up without a scratch.

Wally took early retirement at 60 through ill health and the failing coal industry. He loved photography, taking cine films of family events. He and Roz played bowls all over the area winning many trophies and he was very proud to be made Honorary President of Eastry Bowls Club. He and Roz took many European holidays making friends along the way but sadly, after Roz died, his life changed dramatically. He had dementia and began to rely more and more on "his girls" yet at the same time becoming more talkative, telling them stories from his life. He liked the simple things in life. He loved his food especially KFC and desserts like Knickerbocker Glory, ice cream, banana splits and always enjoyed a coffee and a large slice of cake when he was taken out. He loved Christmas and Christmas decorations, covering his house with lights, rarely taking them down because "They made him smile" he also collected teddies ending up with a large collection that filled an armchair.

He was the perfect family man. Grateful for "his girls", his three grandchildren and three great grandchildren. A quiet man, a listener rather than a talker. He never raised his voice, never angry, always a gentleman. He often used these simple but meaningful words "Thanks for all your doing". That was Wally.

Ragwort: a controversial plant

Ragwort is a common plant, a relative of dandelions with yellow 'flowers' (strictly inflorescences, each 'petal' is a flower in its own right). Like dandelions it scatters its seeds by producing 'clocks', whole sets of fruits attached to each flowering head, each with a feathery 'parachute' to aid dispersal. This is a very efficient dispersal mechanism so ragwort plants can frequently dominate areas of pasture or hedgerows.

It (actually there are four species of ragwort but, as the name suggests, the common ragwort dominates) is a native British species, its flowers and their pollen and nectar forming a valuable food source for thousands of insect species. However, the body of the plant is very toxic, containing alkaloids which, if eaten, can kill cattle and horses by damaging the liver. Happily it also has a very bitter taste so livestock avoid eating it unless desperate when pasture is poor or over-grazed.

If the plant is cut down or uprooted it loses its bitter taste but not its toxicity so all attempts at eradication from a field must involve rapid removal of the plants and their destruction, often by burning.

The Cannabar Moth enjoys a fascinating relationship with ragwort. The moths lay



their eggs on the plant leaves and they hatch into caterpillars which eat the plant, unharmed by the toxins rather, in turn, accumulating them in their own tissues making them toxic to animals if they eat them. To capitalise on this toxicity the caterpillars have evolved a striped yellow and black colouration which serves as a warning; animals learn to avoid potential prey showing such colouration. Yellow in insects is pretty well universally a warning colour; think of the wasp.

The story does not end there. Cuckoos are migratory birds, overwintering in Southern Africa and breeding in Britain and other European countries. As is well known the cuckoo is a nest/ brood parasite, laying its eggs individually in the nests of other species of bird. These 'foster parents' then hatch and feed the cuckoo chick, to the detriment of their own chicks. (This seems bizarre to us. It results from the fact that birds' behaviour is largely innate/ inborn; a series of invariable responses to particular stimuli, rather than the learned behaviour, based on trial and error or copying others, found in mammals including ourselves). This cuckoo breeding niche requires that the adults migrate North early in the year, to be present in Europe when other birds start to breed. They then return to Africa as early as mid August, so are here for a limited period. Given this they need to feed up rapidly ready for the flight back to Africa. This is made easier by the fact that they have evolved immunity to the ragwort toxins in the cinnabar caterpillars, which they eat in huge numbers.

Gardening on the other side of the fence (11)

We have now been in Eastry for just over two years and are looking forward to our third season with this garden. It is quite hard not to 'wish your life away' in gardening terms and always want to see the end result of your labours but I took the decision to only plant very young trees and shrubs and to grow as many of my own plants as possible, so it will still be some years before the garden "re-matures".

I have continued to invest in organic bulb buying and another 225 went in last autumn — Narcissus 'Thalia'; Tulip 'Ballerina' & 'Ronaldo' (for the colour, and NOT my football allegiances); Dog's Tooth Violet; more Crocus tomassinianus; Tulipa sylvestris, a naturalising 'woodland' tulip and lastly,100 Camassia 'Quamash' into my meadow area.



New additions of bee-friendly shrubs have been Spindle (Euonymus europaeus) 'Red Cascade'; Flowering Currant (Ribes sanguineum) 'King Edward VI' and Buddliea globosa. On the edible wildlife- friendly front, Sweet Cicely, hardy Kiwi fruit 'Hayward' and Chilean Guava (Myrtus Ugni) are all first-time plants for me. And at ground level I have been filling in 'waste-ground' behind the garage and greenhouse with Sweet violets and other wildflowers and propagating young Bugle (Ajuga) plants for an"amphibian highway" along the edge of my tarmac driveway (my neighbours in that direction have lots of the local frogs and I want to provide a route for the young frogs to disperse to my pond).

The meadow was less interesting last summer due to the prolonged hot weather and although a few more Yellow Rattleflowers appeared I have sown another generous batch of seed in the past autumn. And I will plug-plant some Ox-Eye Daisies that I have sourced from another garden to add to some young seedlings that have grown from 2021's seed sowing.

Wildlife wise, there were no new bird visitors in 2022. Having reached 27 species in the first year, that has been a bit disappointing. I have been seeing far fewer small birds in and around the garden. Neither myself or my neighbour have seen a hedgehog since the mid-summer. We don't know whether to blame the hot weather or the scrub/bramble clearance in Eastry Court Farm where the contractors have been very busy tiding up prior to its planned sale and development. I have yet to see a toad or slow worm in this garden. Other long-time residents have also seen a decline in these once common garden visitors so Eastry appears to reflect the nationwide trends for these species.

The Kent originated 'Bugs Matter' survey reported continued declines in insect numbers and Butterfly Conservation also reported another quiet summer. I have now identified 134 types of moth visiting the garden but moths have also declined by 48% in the south-east in the past 30 years or so.

Your garden is one of the few places that you can individually try and make a difference. Enjoy your gardening in 2023.

Bird Watching with Big Nick

For various reasons I haven't managed to get out much with my camera over the last month or so, but I did make a brief visit to Restharrow Scrape at Sandwich Bay the other day, which gave me the inspiration for this column. At this time of year the Scrape is home to many birds that move south for winter, species such as Lapwing, Greylag Geese, Curlew and several species of duck — Shoveler, Tufted Duck, Gadwall, Mallard and lots of Teal (often numbering several hundreds). Every now and then something spooks the birds and they rapidly take to the air in a great flurry of splashing and wing beats; circling overhead until they perceive the danger has passed, they will then return to the Scrape. Sometimes it's difficult to know what has disturbed them, but it is commonly a bird of prey in the area that causes their panic.

Common Snipe are also regularly found on the Scrape during winter, best seen when they are out in the open, feeding by probing the wet ground with their long bills for worms and grubs. If they are resting up in the clumps of grass and reeds you might easily miss them, their stripy brown and yellowish plumage is very effective camouflage. However, spend a few minutes searching the vegetation on the little islands and you may suddenly see one – and then another, and another. Once you've 'got your eye in' you realise there are quite a few. On one occasion, I established there were probably 25 Common Snipe in the undergrowth. Suddenly a military jet fighter screamed overhead and put all the birds into the air. As birds tend to flock together roughly by species this gave me an opportunity to count them –there were 75 Snipe. That's three times the number I'd managed to find on the ground!

If you are very lucky you may see a Jack Snipe, a little smaller than the Common Snipe with a shorter bill and quite noticeable golden stripes down its back. They have a very peculiar habit of constantly bobbing up and down as if on a spring – the reason is unknown, but the movement can often be the first thing that gives them away to an observer. They breed in the far north of Europe and Russia, spending their winters anywhere from the UK, across Europe and into tropical Africa. One or two turn up at the Scrape most years, you just have to be there at the right time.
