Eastry Neighbourhood Watch - Latest

Recent fraud scams to be aware of:-

Fake Emails impersonating Temu (an on-line marketing company).

This scam involves emails from the on-line company telling you can win free products by simply clicking on a link and completing a quick survey. The link will take you to a realistic looking website that is under the control of the criminals, where they will steal your personal data.

Latest QR code scam

Thames Water have advised that they have been made aware of a fake letter sent to some customers, containing a QR code which directs them to a fraudulent website offering help with paying their bills. The website then goes on to ask for personal information such as date of birth, address and passport number. It is a SCAM.

Thames Water have outlined that they would never ask customers for their personal or financial details, access to their online account or for any urgent action or a rushed decision. They "take the security of (their) customer,s information very seriously and do everything to make sure their data is well protected." Its possible customers of other water companies might be targeted in similar ways.

The Journey Towards the Empty Tomb.

With Christmas now past, we are already in February, and we begin our journey towards the glories of the Easter season. But before we get to Easter, we have to get through Lent- and it is about this time of year we start to think about what we might be giving up for those forty days.

Now before we immediately jump to giving up chocolate or crisps, it is important to remember that Lent isn't simply about adjusting our diet. Rather, it is a time when what we give up helps us to focus our energy into developing our relationship with God and giving something back to the world around us.

Each year at the Vicarage, I try to give something up...and if (or when) I fail, I put some money into a small pot which at the end of the season gets donated to a particular charity. My aim this year is to try to give up on making any comments that could be perceived as negative (not always easy as a blunt Northern Irishman!)- instead focusing on the positive gifts of God's world around us and giving positive affirmation. My wife believes that my little money pot may end up rather full but I shall do my best! At the end of the day, it is my hope that I will be able to reflect the love that God has for me outwardly and, in turn, that others will do the same.

Lent is a season in which we prepare ourselves to join Christ as he journeys to Jerusalem and experiences the hardships that follow, ultimately leading us to the cross. It is for those reasons we have that focus on giving something up. But in that time we are also drawn closer to God as we prepare for the Holy Week and the wonders of the Tomb left empty.

God gave us a wonderful creation to enjoy both when it's glorious and when it's a little less glorious, when nothing seems to be going right. Each of us has a choice how we respond not only for the next forty days but for the rest of the year. We can go forward with that focus of making the most of what we choose to give up bringing us closer to God and those around us, or we can simply let it pass as if it were simply another season of change. Either way, let us do it in a positive spirit and perhaps we can make a difference here in our village. What might seem like a small thing to us makes a massive impact on others.

So if you give something up or take something on, I wish you every blessing in this season of Lent and look forward to seeing you when we come to celebrate the wonders of that glorious Easter morning and the miracle of the empty tomb.

I remember these biscuits being served alongside semolina pudding at school. We loved them and they are so easy to make children will enjoy helping.

Ingredients:-

100g Butter or margarine

75g Sugar

1 Egg yolk

1 tsp Vanilla essence or extract

125g Self raising flour

Rolled oats or crushed cornflakes (honey nut will do)

Heat the oven to 370F, 190C or Gas 5. Grease or line 2 baking trays. Cream together the fat and sugar and then beat in the egg yolk and vanilla. Stir in the flour until you have a stiff dough.

Have the oats or crushed cornflakes in a dish. Divide the dough into 24, then take each piece, mould it into a ball and roll in the oats/cornflakes. You can put a little piece of glace cherry on the top of each one if wished. Arrange on the baking sheet and bake for 15 - 20 minutes.

The Village Hall Council wishes to know of the future intentions of ETC and has encouraged me to call a meeting, of all those people who may be interested, to make a decision on the immediate future of EASTRY THEATRE COMPANY.

For this purpose, I have arranged a meeting to be held in Eastry Village Hall on:-

MONDAY 26TH FEBRUARY AT 7.30 PM.

The only discussion will be on THE FUTURE OF EASTRY THEATRE COMPANY, and if the decision is to carry on, then an ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING could follow adhering to THE TERMS OF REFERENCE OF EASTRY THEATRE COMPANY which was established on its inauguration meeting in December 1995 which states such a meeting should be held annually along with the named officers forming the Executive Committee. Unfortunately, those terms of reference have not been fully adhered to in recent years.

Bubbles Nursery

As you might have seen from recent media coverage Bubbles Nursery in Eastry (as part of a nationwide chain) closed at the end of December 2023. Included here is an article by Monica Laslett (chairperson EYPC) regarding this closure.

It is with great sadness that I am writing this to inform all of the people in Eastry that Bubbles Nursery and Out of School Club (OSC) closed it's doors suddenly for the last time on Friday 29th December. This came completely out of the blue, not expected at all. We were a busy nursery. Now 10 people are out of work and the village has lost a vital childcare facility.

Bubbles Nursery and OSC was first opened in September 1995 by Trudi Gibb in a portacabin on the site owned by Eastry Young Peoples Club. I myself was fortunate enough to be employed by Trudi in April 1996 and have continued to remain there, seeing many changes over the years.

In 2004 my husband Dick Laslett MBE as chairperson of EYPC committee along with Trudi Gibb, Sheila Smith, Teddy Birnberg, Margaret Bullock, Colin Humphreys, John Kemp and Bill and Brenda Roberts raised the funds to have PA Hollingworth erect the building which is on site now. One half used for the young people of Eastry two nights a week. The other half leased out for a children's nursery and OSC.

In 2006 Bernadette and John Gibbs took on the lease for 8 busy years. Famous for the amazing food they cooked for the children.

In 2014 Alpha Nurseries a large company from Ipswich took on the lease and remained there until close.

EYPC are the owners of the building and would very much like it to remain open as a nursery and OSC. As a committee we are doing all we can to get it up and running again. Due to circumstances this will

Bohemian Waxwings - a hippy story?

Late 2023 and hopefully these early months of 2024 qualify as a 'waxwing winter'.

Waxwings are Starling sized birds with elegant plumage including a pink crest and breast, a black throat and mask, a black tail tipped with bright yellow and yellow on the wings. Their name stems from the fact that they bear red waxy secretions on some of their flight feathers. The importance of these is not clear but they probably help attract a mate. The crest is also used in courtship, being raised almost to a vertical position whilst lowering the tail, ruffling the belly feathers and adopting a horizontal posture. More likely to be seen in birds here in the winter is the threat pose to a rival, where the bird becomes stiffly upright with the crest firmly flattened to the head. More common behaviour to watch for is their acrobatics in feeding on berries. often on flimsy stems unable to withstand the bird's weight.

They occur in flocks on trees bearing berries, Rowans are their favourites, uttering ringing type calls. As a result, many people, including folk who do not usually go out of their way to look at birds, have flocked to Stonelees nature reserve on the Sandwich side of Pegwell Bay and to isolated berry trees in streets in Broadstairs to watch and photograph them.

Waxwings' normal habitats are woodlands in Fennoscandia, the Scandinavian, Finnish and Kola Peninsulas and in Karelia, the Westernmost area of Russia. Here they feed on flowers, fruit and insects, nesting and breeding in the forest trees and in parks and gardens. They are not normally particularly migratory, simply moving to lower lying more sheltered areas within their normal range in winter. They subsist through those winter months overwhelmingly on berries, which are rich in sugars in the soft, fruit, part and in protein, starches and oils in the hard seed, the embryo plant. Each bird consumes 800-1000 berries a day, roughly twice its body weight in berries.

In some years the berry crop fails due to poor weather conditions in the summer and autumn. This causes the waxwings to **irrupt**; to move in huge numbers out of their normal range first into Northern Europe then, if food there is scarce too, further and further South, sometimes reaching Britain across the North Sea so most commonly occurring along the East coast. Here they are often found in large numbers on berry bearing trees, often stripping the tree and then moving on to the next. This often leads



to their being seen in unusual places in suburban streets and, especially, in supermarket car parks, which are often furnished with decorative berry trees.

Gardening on the other side of the fence – no.17

Cold, early January and the gardening season is still only on the horizon. However as part of my resolution to increase the amount of bulbs in the garden I have two options in the pipeline. As mentioned before I am endeavouring to only plant organic bulbs. I have found another UK based supplier (www.organicgardener.co.uk, a Dutch grower who has relocated to Devon) and will be planting a batch of tulip bulbs, just received, later today. There are plenty of bulb buying bargains to be had in the latter part of the year and while you have less choice, the savings are substantial. Tulips are usually recommended to be planted later than other bulbs in order to reduce the risk of the tulip fire virus and plenty of growers report that they flower perfectly well from January plantings.

Some other bulbs establish best from being planted "in the green", which is when they are in active growth. Snowdrops are most often recommended for this method but suppliers offer plenty of other choices. I have just ordered 100 of our native, wild daffodil (Narcissus pseudonarcissus) (from www.naturescape.co.uk). I expect these to be delivered in February. I had previously ordered these from another supplier in autumn 2021, but they turned out to have sent the wrong variety. I ignored this in 2022 but sent I photographic evidence in 2023 and received a full refund. As they were individually planted in my orchard meadow, I have no urge to dig them up again. Fortunately, they are still a quite discreet flowered daff, not one of the big boisterous yellow varieties.

One tool purchase has transformed bulb planting and will help save my ageing wrists from the rigors of this task: an awl attachment for an electric drill. I like to avoid the use of power tools as much as possible but this really has been a game-changer for large-scale planting.

The tulips are going into a small gap between a raised veg bed that sits in front of my greenhouse. Last year this was planted with sunflowers with the bonus of having somewhere easy to tie them to for support and I will repeat that again. After the bulbs go in, I will be mulching with shredded apple tree prunings, both for weed suppression and soil enhancement. I urge you to look up the work of a pioneer regenerative agriculture farmer, Iain Tolhurst. Experimentation with the use of wood chips and the results so far achieved have turned them from a waste product into a revenue earner for many tree surgeons. The last addition has been a dwarf Narcissus, 'W.P. Milner' but these were dry bulbs and may not flower this year as Narcissus start rooting in September and flowering can be determined by the amount of rainfall in that period.

I was away for both the Village fete and the last Safari in 2023, but I will be growing pollinator-friendly plants for both this year. I look forward to saying hello to some of you then.

Getting Bees through the Winter

A frequent beekeeping question is 'Do bees hibernate?' No; they cluster. What is the difference?

Hibernation is 'passing the winter in a dormant or inactive state'. By clustering bees remain active; on certain winter days they even fly from the hive. But, as the ambient temperature in the hive falls below 17 ° C they group together. As the temperature falls further the grouping becomes tighter; layers of bees on the outside forming a protective shell, whilst, most bees, in the centre of the group, continue to move, but less actively. This is the cluster, a dynamic group of bees, which will change size depending on the surrounding air temperature.

Bees on the outside of the group can disengage their wings and relax their wing muscles. The equivalent of shivering this releases extra heat energy. Having completed their stint on the periphery a bee will move inwards, replaced by another warmer bee. Occasionally the temperature of a bee falls too low, at which point they will die and fall to the bottom of the hive, to be removed later.

Winter is a fraught time for both bees and beekeeper; both hope they have prepared well for the trials that might befall them; preparation which started the Summer before.

Winter bees are different from summer bees; they have a longer life expectancy – 6 months instead of 6 weeks. Winter bees must live through to the Spring to rear the next generation. A key job of any beekeeper is to ensure that sufficient, healthy, winter bees were produced back in August; without several thousand the cluster will not be large enough to keep warm and the colony will die.

The beekeeper must also ensure the queen is fit to get through the winter and can start to lay up eggs come February. As a queen cannot easily be replaced until mid-Spring, the loss of the queen is a death sentence for the colony.

Sufficient food stores, some 20kg, must also be available in the hive. This will be eaten and used to generate heat. Remarkably, when the queen starts to lay the brood nest – the area where the larvae are developing – it is kept at a constant 34 °C. even when ambient temperature may be hovering around zero. A key task of the beekeeper is to check that there are sufficient stores going into the winter, and where they are light, to feed to make up the shortfall.

In addition, the hive must be weatherproof and protected from predators, such as mice and green woodpeckers. Apart from checking that a hive is not blown over or entrances become blocked with snow; other than keeping their fingers crossed, there is little more a beekeeper can do.
